we held our own in-house workshop entitled Spring. It was attended by 14 members and the workshop was given by Carol Campbell and Judy


Gratton – everyone went home with a beautiful Easter themed arrangement with the addition of chocolate eggs hidden within the design.

## **Wistaston Conservation Group**

#### **Outlet Found**

Following on from our last article in the Spring issue of 'Roundabout', on the 22<sup>nd</sup> January we resumed our search for the elusive, some thought mythical, outletpipe and were successful when two of our group disturbed some silt and moved a large piece of wood. The waters began to flow and in ten minutes the 'pond' had disappeared. We have now replaced the excavated spoil and we will plant some daffodils, crocus and bluebells. We also modified the pipe entrance with stone slabs, to lessen the effects of it silting-up.







#### Wistaston Brook, erosion and flooding.

Most people now accept that our weather will continue to be affected by Climate Change, and flooding is likely to increase. Last winter and this spring have been one of the wettest on record. The Conservation Group have been busy trying to tackle the effects of flooding and drainage issues at the Spinney and in the Old Covert, not far from the Scout hut. Paths that in times past required a minimum of maintenance, now are turned into a sea of mud after even moderate rainfall due to the soil being saturated.

Generally, and these effects are not confined to just our locality, nature-based solutions such as wetlands and woodlands slow down the flow of water. Adding trees will also stabilize river banks and other areas prone to erosion and can be beneficial to wildlife. Also, more trees will help with Carbon Sequestration via Photosynthesis, otherwise known as Carbon Capture.

Natural flood management, using natural materials can include a number of approaches, such as creating a 'leaky dam' with branches or tree trunks strategically placed to slow the flow and filter out sediment washed downstream. Similarly, 'buffer strips' made up from vegetation to hold runoff, and the creation of ponds to temporarily hold the excess water can be used.

Nationally as much as 90% of wetlands have been lost in the past century. The interception of rainwater by trees can spread the negative effects of rainfall over a longer period allowing the rainfall to enter rivers or streams gradually. Thus reducing bank erosion. Allowing a water course to run naturally by removing debris is vital in reducing floodwater damage.

Not all of the aforementioned solutions are suitable for use in our locality, but we will adapt them where and when we can. During a sustained period of high river flow, bank erosion can be problematic, and this can be seen in our Wistaston Brook. Reinforcing the bank with wooden stakes to protect the footpath has been successfully done further downstream from Joev the Swan, and could be employed as a cost effective method elsewhere if needed.

It holds back water temporarily allowing a steady flow to enter a watercourse, and leaving much of the sediment behind.

#### Ash Dieback Disease

THIS ARTICLE MAY BE OF PARTICULAR INTEREST TO THOSE OF US HAV-ING ASH TREES IN THEIR GARDENS.It has been estimated that Ash dieback fungus disease (Hymenoscyphus fraxineus) will kill up to 80% of ash trees across the UK. It will change our landscape forever and threaten many animal species which rely on Ash trees.

The disease originating in Asia, does not affect Ash trees there. However, its introduction to Europe about 30 years ago has devastated the European Ash population as our native species did not evolve with the fungus and therefore have no natural defence against it.

In the UK, ash dieback has had the most impact in the south-east of England, where it was first recorded in 2012. It is unknown how long the fungus was in the area before symptoms became apparent, perhaps some years, but a preventative ban on the importation of ash trees was put in place at this time, as it is thought it could have been imported on ash saplings. The spores of the fungus are also carried on the wind and this may also be the cause of the spread to our country.

We now see evidence of the disease throughout the UK. However we are still at the beginning of the epidemic, and won't know the full impact for a while. The slow progress of the disease makes it difficult to recognise, and we need to track the sometimes subtle changes brought about by ash dieback.

### NORTHERN LIGHTS DISPLAY DAZZLES **WISTASTON SKY WATCHERS**

This magnificent photograph and of course the display was just too late for our Spring Roundabout. However here it is now:


Wistaston residents were treated to a rare dazzling display of colours from the spectacular Northern Lights aurora on the evening of Sunday 3rd March 2024.

There was a sudden peak in solar activity with a 'red alert' issued by Aurora-Watch UK. Vibrant colours of red, purple and green were then on display. It could be seen across large parts of the UK, from Scotland down as far south as Cornwall

Charged particles entered our atmosphere and interacted with oxygen and nitrogen. With the tilt of the Earth in relation to the Sun positioned at right angles during the equinox, the magnetic field is stronger resulting in a more vibrant aurora.

The origin of 'peck order' in birds is entitlement of the highest ranked in a colony to feed first. We notice a kind of peck order in our visiting corvids and pigeons which look around themselves to keep watch on neighbours, taking care not to get too close in case of trouble. Is it in fact simply that each bird, whatever the species, wants as much food as possible kept to itself? It is unusual to fight to the death, but we have witnessed a squabble between two jackdaws where the weaker was pinned down on its back while a magpie, not associated with feeding at the time, hopped along to inflict an extra peck on the victim, as if taking sides. Luckily the jackdaws broke off battle and magpie hopped away. With magpies being cannibalistic maybe this individual was eying up a possible meal out of a family member.

Cometh the freeze and we watch neighbours' puddings of fat in coconut shells being stolen by squirrels which run off with them, to savour in safety, birds scarcely getting a lick.

25.1. and a sparrowhawk scything diagonally across lawn, like a slender leaf drifting in wind: a 'blink and you'll miss it' moment. Our January song thrush sang in February this year, repetitive notes unmistakable. Three siskins mixed with other finches, to charm us, this winter, perhaps travelling south from wintry conditions in Scottish pine forests. Another name for this bird, stemming from the days when kept in cages, presumably on account of the sweet twittering song, is 'aberdevine', a word dating back to 1700s. We have not found the origin of the word, which prompted us to seek the origin of 'nuthatch', a bird recently exploring a fork of our tree. Apparently the bird has a tendency to wedge a nut in tree bark before splitting it open with its 'hatchet' bill.

A 'thank you' to Graham Roberts of Berkeley Crescent, reporting a fox on the pavement, 19.1. He sees foxes once or twice a year and wonders if they come from Salander Covert behind the house.

Three dollops of frogspawn in our pond is a record for us!

Late March brought chiffchaff song to Sandylands Park, perhaps one of the first heralds of spring, further augmented by an orange-tip butterfly in early April.

#### Ash dieback can affect ash trees of all ages.

#### Recognition of the disease

Leaves develop dark patches in the summer. They then wilt and discolour to black. Leaves might shed early.

Blackened or shrivelled leaves.

Diamond-shaped black lesions (which look like bruises) on the bark.

Dead external branches with new growth towards the centre of the tree. This is known as 'epicormic growth'.

Sunken and dark lesions on the branches and trunk.

NOTE It is advisable to wait until the tree has come back into leaf to properly confirm the presence of the disease.

> However, not all ash trees are fatally affected. Potentially tolerant ash trees will be protected as far possible, letting nature take its course by allowing the more affected ash trees to decline. This will improve the resilience of our woods to future epidemics. The genetic diversity of trees in existing woods will be increased and when planting new woods, a mix of native tree species will be used.

#### You can help by doing the following:

Clean your shoes before and after visiting a wood. Avoid taking cuttings or plant material from the countryside. Wash your car or bike wheels to remove mud or plant matter. If you think you've spotted the signs and symptoms of ash dieback report them through Tree Alert, a website sponsored by the Forestry Commission.


