





# **Wistaston Village Cricket Club**

(Founded 1980)

For Wistaston Village Cricket Club, 2024 saw another season of mixed fortunes for our senior and junior sides. Our First Eleven playing in the strong Cheshire Cricket League Division 3 certainly found the season challenging and to their credit finished their campaign after twenty-two fixtures with their final record reading won 8, lost 11 with 3 abandoned. with a final tally of 186 points. If the abandoned matches had been played it could easily have resulted with additional points that would have seen them with an improved table reading.

The Second Eleven:- competing in the North Stafford South Cheshire Premier Cricket League Division 8 also had a challenged season. In a league of just nine clubs, a season's final total of four victories from their sixteen fixtures with one fixture abandoned accumulated a total of 127 points, but unfortunately resulted in the team finishing in second to bottom position by just one point and affected relegation. Final table :- Played 22 Won 8 Lost 11 Abandoned Points 127.

The Swans XI: The ladies team "The Swans" competing in Division 4 (West) of Cheshire Women's Cricket League enjoyed a productive season. From their ten fixtures they finished in third position. Their playing record was much improved from last season which is reflected in the final table - Final table:- Played 10 Won 7 Lost 3 Points 192.

Women's Softball League. The Women's softball team had an enjoyable season ending 4th in their table with a playing record of Played 10 Won 4 Lost 6 Points 12.

Junior sides: Under 9's:- The under 9's finished their playing season having had a positive campaign finishing with a final league position of 8th. In a league of some eighteen teams, the play was very competitive which reflected in the final points standing - Final table:- Played 17 Won 7 Lost 6 Cancelled 2 Abandoned 0 Conceded 2 Points 115.

Under 11's:- Our under 11's completed a demanding season and finished the season in 12th position out of 15 - Final table:- Played 14 Won 4 Lost 8 Abandoned 2 Points 67.

**Under 13's:-** Our under 13's completed their season in attaining twelfth position out of 15 in their league. In what could be considered a demanding season from fourteen fixtures they attained 2 wins and lost 10 matches with two games cancelled finishing with a points total of 42

Senior winter nets are to be on Wednesday evening from 1900hrs to 2000hrs across 2 lanes at the Cricket Barn, which will run from 08/01/2025 to 01/04/2025.

# **Wistaston Conservation Group**

#### The Great UK Water Blitz.

Across the UK, our waterways are in crisis and as a result the charity 'Earthwatch' (website http://earthwatch.org) has invited participants, or 'citizen scientists' to monitor the amount of nitrates and phosphates in local freshwater bodies, rivers, canals, ponds and lakes. This 'Great UK Water Blitz' was the first of its kind to be carried out, and it is hoped that it will provide a snapshot of conditions of water quality, similar to that being done for endangered wildlife species.

As part of this, in June and September, a member from our conservation group measured the water quality of Wistaston Brook, as part of the ongoing survey.

Both nitrates and phosphates occur naturally in the environment and are essential to plant



growth, but high levels of these nutrients trigger excessive plant and algae growth, which in turn reduce oxygen levels in water and impact on aquatic fauna and flora.

The modernisation and intensification of agriculture during and after World War 2 has undoubtedly led to excess nitrates in the environment. In particular the use of artificial fertilisers which add no organic content to the soil and being water soluble, wash easily from farmland through the groundwater into our rivers and streams. The Environment Agency estimates that 50 to 60 per cent of nitrate losses into the water environment comes from agriculture whilst sewage effluent contributes about 25 to 30 per cent nationally.

It is estimated that households contribute 73 per cent of total phosphorus to watercourses, while agriculture contributes 20 per cent. During heavy rainfall the capacity of sewers can be exceeded, leading to sewage being released into rivers and streams. These combined sewer overflows were developed to act as overflow valves to reduce the risk of sewage backing up during heavy rainfall. They do the same today but have to cope with vastly increased levels of output.

It is probably no surprise then, that the results show that 75 per cent of the sample points across the UK have poor ecological health. The Anglian and Thames river basin has the poorest health and the Solway Tweed river basin shows the best health. The former having a much higher population and more intensive farming than the latter.

Locally. Wistaston Brook recorded acceptable health in both June and September. The brook was sampled at the point near the Spinney during dry weather conditions. However, further upstream, above Church Lane another participant recorded unacceptable ecological conditions in June.

Another Water Blitz will take place in 2025 and we look forward to sharing the results with our readers.

#### Cleaner Water Ahead!

As mentioned in the previous article there has been frequent mention of pollution in waterways by sewage for many years now. This seems to be a fairly recent problem, but in fact it is not, to judge by the photograph and caption shown below.

United Utilities our local water company is currently in the process of planning steps to be taken to reduce the amount of effluent entering our own Wistaston Brook in times of heavy rainfall. Plans put forward include a massive 36000 cubic metre holding tank for sewage to be situated on land between the Wistaston Brook housing estate and the brook itself.

During heavy rainfall, the tank will store the surface water and sewage until the rain stops, then the contents will be pumped through a pipeline, to the treatment works at Worleston, instead of having to overspill into Wistaston Brook.

In addition, United Utilities have agreed to pay Scottish Power to place overhead electricity power lines underground. This is in order to facilitate the work mentioned above, but it will improve the overall appearance of the local area as well.

Work on this should take place in April of next year.

The water company has promised to keep residents informed of progress and consultation meetings will be held locally, most probably at the Memorial Hall on Church Lane.



#### WISTASTON HALL

The hall was occupied by a member of the Delves Broughton family, related to the family of that name at Doddington. He was in dispute with the local authority about sewage pollution in the local watercourse. Problems relating to sewage disposal in the area go back at least 100 years. The hall overlooks an area known as Joey the Swan. It is remarkable for a bird to be still remembered in this way about fifty years after his death.

#### What we did one Monday at the end of September.

We met up as usual intending to split into two groups, one to tackle the potholes and pools of water on the various pathways and the other to transfer compost from our bins at the Old Railway site into a new nursery bed and then plant some young trees there.





In the event, we got word that due to the strong winds during the night a large tree had fallen, completely blocking the path leading to the car park on Wistaston Green Road.

We decided this needed priority. So, we split into three groups and all three jobs received attention despite the bad weather. The tree was removed, pools and potholes filled and the trees planted. All in a morning's work.

## Wistaston Memorial Hall and Community Centre

#### General Update

A duo of events took place at Wistaston Memorial Hall and Community Centre to celebrate the 75th anniversary of its The Memorial opening. Hall was constructed in memory of sixteen Wistonians who perished in the Second World War. The Memorial Hall was officially opened by the Hon. Lady Barlow, Chairman of the Cheshire Rural Community Council, on Saturday 26th March 1949.



On Thursday 12th September 2024 in the afternoon there was an exhibition to showcase the Hall's past, present and future; whilst in the evening there was a concert featuring music from the Crewe Concert Band.

The afternoon exhibition coincided with Heritage Open Days and included several displays relating to the Hall's history from its official opening to current organisations that use the premises and plans for a future rebuild. Hall organisations that setup a stall included South Cheshire George Formby Ukulele Society, Cancer Research UK Xmas Fair, Nantwich & District Scottish Society, Crewe Movie Makers, Wistaston Flower Club, South Cheshire Orchestra, Crewe & District Coin and Medal Society, U3A, Studio 97 Art Group and Wistaston Gardening Society.

The evening concert featured Crewe Concert Band conducted by their Musical Director, Adam Shilton. The band performed a variety of music from the lifetime of the Hall. The band played in its usual enthusiastic, energetic and professional manner to the appreciative audience. Refreshments were provided during the interval and there was a prize raffle.

Crewe Concert Band were established in 1982 and are Crewe's longest running concert band. The band is open to musicians from a wide range of ages, backgrounds and experiences. The Band performs a variety of concerts (both indoor and outdoor) each year around the Crewe area, including Nantwich and Alsager. They rehearse on Thursday evenings from 7:30pm to 9:30pm at Wistaston Memorial Hall, which has been the band's home for around 30 years! #### CREWE & NANTWICH RAMBLING CLUB


Our Christmas Workshop will be on Friday 6th December 2-4 p.m. and this will be a table arrangement all ready for the Christmas festivities

# NATURE ARTICLE



We had a slight improvement in butterfly sightings with warmer conditions, speckled wood and red admiral crossing our garden: the former the yellow-spotted brown, lover of woodland shade, therefore a privilege to see in our gardens; latter common but, unlike speckled wood, unable to survive our winters in any of its stages. Joyce and Andrew Booth reported painted lady, peacock, comma and speckled wood in mid August. As to be expected, it is the buddleia bush that attracted the insects. Once upon a time we, too, had a buddleia, but it seemed to die away mysteriously and how we miss it.

Last year we experienced a sunflower extravaganza, huge plants dominating back garden. This year an early crop of self-sown potatoes rather spoiled the display, but there were still some magnificent specimens attracting insects, mainly bees and flies. Lavender, however, remained the favourite source of nectar. It was amusing, as the sunflower blooms were fading, to see a squirrel climbing a stem, to detach a seed-head. It was not uncommon to witness this impish creature bounding along with a head wedged in its mouth. A first-rate demolition artist!

Thanks to Belinda Walters we learnt the reason for starlings descending en masse to peck rigorously at the lawn. They are after leatherjackets, the larvae of crane-flies (daddy-longlegs). Crane-flies live, in their adult state, only a few days, long enough to breed, and birds do a lot of good by gobbling up the larvae in the soil, which are harmful to the roots of grass and plants generally.

Thanks also to Chris Waling of Sandylands Park, describing night sightings of animals, including a fox, caught by his infra-red camera. In daytime all the common species of tit visit his garden, along with robin.

Andy Woodman of Kemble Close, a litter-picker and wildlife enthusiast, was presented, in October, with a lawn of fifteen magpies, a fox sighting, and female sparrowhawk tearing a young magpie to bits.

He doesn't chase squirrels as he likes to see them!

There have been hints of buzzards in the skies and singing of chiffchaff mid September. Chiffchaffs are known to stay with us till October before setting off to winter in South Africa. However, mild conditions here sometimes encourage them to stick around.

Autumn is always an exciting time for those who feed the birds, the cold weather bringing more varied species to our gardens; or is it just that the barer boughs are destroying their cover?!

We continue the true story of how Madame Klara came to Wistaston and opened her Salon:

Jonathan White has sent us the following narrative:

#### DLUGIE TO ZA LATA OD KOSOWA

Kosow is a small town set in rural Poland. In 1939, surrounded by forest and farmland it enjoyed the peace such towns possess. Its citizens worked in the glass factory or the brickworks, both owned by the Grycewicz Family or they worked in the surrounding countryside on the farms or in the forests. One of the Grycewicz's sons, one Joseph by name, was both a farmer and a forester.

Joseph was happily married to Maria and their union was blessed with four young children, three girls and a boy. Klara Teresa Katagina was one of the three charming girls. The happiness of this idvllic family was blown apart amidst the bombs and shells of the Nazi invasion of their land in that late summer of '39. Soon Kosow's streets echoed to the tread of the jackbooted reign of terror with which Hitler ravaged Poland.

Like so many of his countrymen Joseph took his life in his hands and joined the underground army. Eventually Joseph had to flee from his farm leaving Maria and her four young children in the hands of an evil enemy who had no hesitation in throwing them all into prison in an attempt to lure Joseph into captivity and eventual execution. After six months these cruel men realised they would not succeed in drawing Joseph into their snare so Maria and her little ones were herded with many other Poles into trains and transported on a long grim journey to a labour camp near Hanover in Germany.

Now little Klara with her brother and two sisters trudged into the fields with their mother and daily slaved, in all weathers, to help the Third Reich raise its crops. However, that was not all; when the Allies' bombers visited Hanover and wrecked the railyards and the tracks running in and out of the city, men, women and children were marched from their camps and driven into the muscle-tearing task of effecting repairs only to have to return again and again after raid succeeded raid.

All this heavy manual work had to be accomplished on one daily meal; a very basic meal of coarse bread and a soup consisting mainly of fish heads and turnips. Klara decided that she would supplement this diet as best she could. She had grown into an engaging little girl who, with a winsome smile, could wheedle from the more tender-hearted farmers potatoes and extra vegetables. The harshness of their existence had sharpened the awareness of the children so that they were quicker to spot an opportunity for gain than they would normally have done. So Klara would risk punishment by slipping away into the fields and woods to gather mushrooms and berries.

Days of grinding toil ran into each other with inexorable monotony until, gradually, rumour began to spread from Hanover into the surrounding countryside right into the camp itself that all was not going well for Hitler's war machine. Soon it became obvious that the Allies would be completely victorious and the happy day arrived when the G.I.'s marched into Klara's camp to be surrounded by its inmates and showered with grateful kisses and interminable hugs from all and sundry. Freedom had arrived with chewing gum, chocolate and a thousand untold, unheard of goodies tumbling from its ever generous pockets and all distributed with smiles wreathed in the smoke of ever-present ten cent cigars. Klara and her brother and sisters rejoiced with Maria and looked forward to returning to their own dear Poland and their long lost father Joseph.

### Wistaston Murder By Esme Gray Foy, age 11

Mrs Sue Mackles was found murdered on 18th July 2024.

This 61 year old woman worked as a teacher for 33 years, then worked on a farm with her husband and was also a part-time baby-sitter.

When her husband died she moved to Wistaston to build a new life. "Wistaston is a lovely place; clean, quiet and the people are nice" she was known to have said after moving into the area.

Sadly, on 18<sup>th</sup> July, Sue was found dead in her home. It was a discovery that has shocked the whole community.

The police came to investigate.

"We have no idea who could have murdered Mrs Mackles" said the police. "Whoever did so was very cunning and left few clues. They carried out the murder with a knife, by the looks of the wound" they added, "but no murder weapon has yet been found".

#### Investigations are ongoing.
