Wistaston Conservation Group

Hello again, here is our latest article to let you know what we did on one day in January and a little about Hoverflies, an unsung but important insect, and how you can help it.

Promoting the wildflowers.



When the unusually cold weather gave way to milder conditions last January, our thoughts turned to the spring and summer when the flowers would start to appear. Some time ago we cleared the land between the Spinney and the wide concrete bridge over the brook, of the long grass and the brambles that had formed a dense cover, hindering growth of the wild flowers so important to butterflies and other species of insects.

So a large team attacked the brambles in this area, three of us using brush cutters to level the

brambles, and cut the grass to a manageable length. In just over an hour a wide area was cleared and it was then the turn of the others to cut, lop, scythe, rake, and carry the debris away to make tidy piles in the wooded area. We call these piles wood-rows or hibernacula and they provide shelter for developing insects and small animals during cold weather.

We also thinned out the tree branches to reduce the thickness of the leaf canopy next summer, this should also help to promote wildflower growth. The resulting branches were added to the wind-rows to weigh them down in case of the return of the strong winds, we had experienced at the end of last year.

Afterwards, it all looked much more open and spacious – the dog walkers certainly appreciated

our efforts. Like many of the jobs we have taken on we will have to do it all over again in time, but we know this and enjoy the work because benefits the area, and people enjoy the improved wildlife habitat.



Hoverflies friends of nature.

It has been suggested that gardeners be asked to do more to help to increase the number of hoverflies. These small flies that are a similar species to houseflies are often mistaken for wasps and bees due to the fact that they have a very similar striped appearance, a natural defence against predators, but unlike wasps and bees they do not have stings and cannot harm people. One sure way to differentiate between bees, wasps and hoverflies is the fact that the former have two pairs of wings and hoverflies only have one pair.

They do however have a similar purpose in nature in that they are essential in pollinating crops and other plants.

It is estimated that the number of hoverflies have declined by 40% since 1980, and that they pollinate over 50% of all plants, second only to bees, which are also in decline.

Hoverflies start their life cycles in water as larvae and because of this ponds and still waters are essential to them. Because of many causes, including more intensive farming and the increased use of insecticides along with the loss of habitat and climate change, hoverflies are now on the Red List of endangered species. Help can be given in many ways such as establishing a small garden pond that does not need to be very deep, a few inches of water with leaf debris will be sufficient provided it is kept topped up in dry weather or by planting small flowering plants such as primroses and lungworts, that provide nectar an essential food for many insects.

Another way of helping is to make a 'Hoverfly Lagoon'. Start with a plastic bucket or a large plastic plant-pot without a hole in the base and cut several small holes in the sides halfway down to allow excess rainwater to drain away, then put some chipped tree bark in the bottom, also a layer of grass clippings to the same depth and compress them. Add a layer of straw or dry leaves and place some sticks vertically down the inside of the bucket to assist the young hoverflies to exit and start their new life as pollinators.

Finally put water in the container, rainwater being preferable, enough to cover the tree bark and the clippings.

The lagoon can be placed anywhere in your garden where it is not likely to be disturbed, and those of us who grow roses may like to know that hoverflies at the larval stage have a voracious



appetite for aphids, and it is quite possible that an adult emerging from your lagoon will lay its eggs in a colony of aphids on your or a neighbour's roses.

If anyone would like to discuss with us the work we do, or suggest future projects they will find us working each Monday morning usually in the Joev the Swan area. We start at 9.30am and finish slightly after mid-day. Our exact location may be found on our website, or displayed on the notice board at the Church Lane entrance.

Historic South West Cheshire Scouts exhibition draws enthusiastic crowds

The rich history of Scouting in South West Cheshire was brought to life during a special exhibition held on Saturday 15th March, and Sunday 16th March 2025. The event took place at the Wistaston Scout Centre in Bluebell Wood, off Elm Drive, Wistaston and attracted visitors eager to explore a fascinating collection of memorabilia spanning more than a century.

Organised by a dedicated team of volunteers, the exhibition featured an extensive array of historical items from the South West Cheshire Scouts District's archives, with artifacts dating back to 1907. Among the treasures on display were badges, pennants, World Scout Jamboree souvenirs, Scouting awards, vintage postcards, and annuals. Enthusiasts also marvelled at a unique collection of Scouts on stamps, historic uniforms, rare books - including a 1920 International Olympia edition - flag staffs, plaques, and newspaper clippings from the 1920s onwards.

A standout attraction was a tent once owned by Scouting founder Lord Baden-Powell, alongside an impressive collection of woggles and a dedicated Gang Show display. Additionally, the exhibition proudly showcased the MBEs awarded to John Bennett MBE and Michael Bennion MBE, both long-time volunteers recognised for their outstanding contributions to Scouting and youth development in Cheshire.

Visitors also had the chance to delve into local Scouting archive records, providing a rare glimpse into the history and impact of the movement in the region.

A particularly special moment during the event was the attendance of Peter and Peggie Taylor from Crewe, both 100 years old and married for nearly 80 years. Peter, the Life President of South West Cheshire Scouts, served as a Wireless Operator on Liberator bombers during World War II and is a former headteacher of Wistaston Green Primary School.

Reflecting on the event, co-organiser Gerald Newbrook expressed his delight at the enthusiastic response: "It's incredible to see how Scouting has evolved over the decades, yet the spirit of adventure and camaraderie remains the same. This exhibition brings to life the stories, traditions, and achievements of Scouts past and present. It's been a joy to share these treasures with the community."

The exhibition was coordinated by Gerald Newbrook, Bob Cave, John Whittingham, Des Scott, Rob Galloway, Roy Bradley, and Keith Sarson.



The South Cheshire Concert Band, formed in 2014, is well known across the region for its enthusiastic musicianship and inclusive community ethos. Their ability to transport listeners through time with music that stirs the soul was on full display during this commemorative evening.

A representative from Wistaston Memorial Hall reflected: "It was an evening to remember - not just for the music, but for the meaning behind it. We're proud to have hosted such a poignant tribute to the past, while celebrating the peace and freedoms hard-won by those who came before us."



NATURE ARTICLE



Blackbirds like to nest low down in a bush, most years a pair starting off in our little conifer, carrying the tell-tale beakloads of material.. Never has a pair completed the task, however, through vulnerability to cats etcetera. Will they ever learn?

A habit of our coal tits is to explore the underside of a bough for titbits (pun not deliberate): such great little acrobats.

Feb. saw the first visit areenfinch since commencement of our winter's garden bird feeding survey in October, and the familiar song thrush notes, bird unseen, late

Jan.-March, dwindled rapidly, as it always does, unfortunately. Both these birds are sadly on the decline.

We were blessed with a male siskin on 12 Feb., brightly yellowy green on chest, and black crown: a treat as nothing unusual has been coming through.

20 Feb. and a very still frog in the pond. Was it sick? However, a tickle produced sluggish movement, and a bloated belly gave evidence of impending spawning. Ripples in the water were thereafter observed with increasing interest, the primary dollop of spawn arriving next morning. We didn't realise our small pond was home to as many as six frogs, and four large lumps of spawn ultimately spread out across the surface. The perpetrators of the deeds were seen frolicking in the joys of the near-spring sun of 22nd - an amusing sight a frog on each of two of the mounds of spawn, proudly announcing 'King of the Castle' - and still the croaking continued.

Now that we've bidden farewell to winter. blackbirds are seen chasing off rival males, and there is evidence of pairing up among jackdaws.

Our thanks to Louise and Andy Woodman of Kemble Close, with reports of sounds of tawny owl, great spotted woodpecker and gulls. There



are blue tits in their bird-boxes, great tit and robin around, and magpies and crows scarifying the lawns.

Late March and our first notes of chiffchaff in trees across road, plus a small copper butterfly in garden, followed by orange tip. Joyce and Andrew Booth are first-timers at hearing willow warbler song, one calling, 7 April, from trees between Freshfields and Salander. They must have thought it a melancholy little song. Swallows abound, but you have to be guick to spot them!

Mammalwise, our thanks to Graham Roberts who, while walking the main path at Joey the Swan on 21.3, saw two water voles nibbling at the foot of the bird-feeder support, south-east corner of The Spinney. How lucky to find these cuddly creatures, declining as so much of our wildlife is. Legally protected, these voles are suffering from habitat loss and predation by American mink. They differ from brown rats by having a blunt nose, small ears and a furry tail.




