## Wistaston Parish Council Chairman's Report

#### 1. Police Matters

We have been requesting increased support to resolve problems within our community, some of which we reported in the last Roundabout.

I am pleased to report that we have received a positive response. We have nominated officers with our PCSO Lorraine Meggs and a police officer, Matt Halliwell. Actions taken include steps to identify menacing e-bike users across recreation open spaces, Hi-vis foot patrols on Joey the Swan, and Speed camera checks.

The arrangement to set up regular beat meetings is particularly welcome. These are held at two locations, St Mary's Church Hall and the Beech Drive Hub.

The meetings are a drop-in style centre for residents to raise issues directly with our officers. We would encourage residents to use these. Dates; times are published on the Council's Website, Facebook and Police Neighbourhood Alert. If in difficulty, contact your Ward Councillor.

#### 2. Council Co-options

At our July meeting, we approved three co-option requests.

We welcome Kay Garner, Mario Scarpa and Vicky Shaw who will join us in our September meeting.

Details are included in our Ward contact information.

#### 3. Alleyways and Footpaths

We have residents report the poor state, sometimes almost impassable, in several of our Alleyways and Footpaths. With few exceptions, all these are either the responsibility of CEC Highways or Public Rights of Way. Where problems are found we would encourage residents to use the CEC's new reporting site, TRACE

One exception not adopted was the Alleyway from Crewe Road to Merrivale Road alongside the Latter-day Saints Church. Our Council agreed to take action and this has been cleared for safe public use.



Our October Demonstrator will be Dorothy Monks from Holmes Chapel with her title 'As You Like It'



#### **Wistaston Village Cricket Club** (Founded 1980)

By the time this latest editorial finds its way through your letterbox, the 2025 cricketing campaign would be approaching the last few weeks of the cricket club's playing season. It again begs the question where does the time go since my last editorial.

Our First XI competing in The Cheshire Cricket League Division 3, have at this time, completed just over half their cricketing programme and are holding a mid-table position having won **five** of their eleven fixtures to date and attaining a total of 99 points. There are opportunities to advance up their league before the end of the playing season.

Our Second XI competing in The North Stafford South Cheshire Premier Cricket League Division 8 have had a successful season so far, attaining 4th position in their league table. From their opening nine fixtures they have managed five victories with a close defeat against Congleton by just 23 runs. So far they have accrued a total of 129 points.

Our Third XI competing in The Stone and District Cricket League Section B North, have from their opening four fixtures accrued 41 points in a closely fought league. They are just **14 points** behind the leaders. They have a record of played 4, won one and lost three, with two close matches. Our ladies eleven "The Swans", competing in Division 4 (West) of Women's Cricket League have won three of their seven opening fixtures which included a valuable 25 points from their first fixture where their opponents conceded their fixture. Presently they have accrued 102 points from their fixtures attaining 4th position in their league.

Our junior sides are competing in their respective leagues within The South Cheshire Junior Cricket League.

Our **Under 9's** are conducting their campaign very well and at the time of this editorial they hold a mid table position in their league with 54 points from their opening eight fixtures.

Our **Under 11's** are enjoying a good season. Currently they hold a **mid** table position in their league with 41 points from their opening eight fixtures.

The Under 13's have played nine fixtures in their league and have accrued 54 Points holding 5<sup>th</sup> position in their league.

## **Wistaston Conservation Group**

Hello everyone. Just a short piece to let you know about the Great UK Water Blitz where samples were taken from Wistaston Brook and about some tasks we carried out away from our usual place of working.

#### Great UK Water Blitz. Part 2.

In our article printed in Roundabout 176 (last Winter) we mentioned how one of our team, who is a member of the Earthwatch Europe charity (website http:// earthwatch.org) had taken and analysed water samples from a "data-point" at Wistaston Brook, and had found that they recorded acceptable health in both June and September 2024, despite the presence of nutrient pollution in the water.

Nutrient pollution occurs when excessive amounts of nutrients, particularly nitrogen and phosphorus, enter a water body, leading to harmful algal blooms and reduced oxygen levels.

On the 26th of April this year more samples were taken from Wistaston Brook at the same data-point near The Spinney and when analysed, the readings for both phosphates and nitrates were found to be within the low range category for water of this type, a fairly fast flowing body of water which is fed by rainwater from farmland where run-off will inevitably lead to a degree of pollution from farming fertilizers.

Regarding the Water Blitz nationally. During 25-28 April, Earthwatch Europe received over 4,000 data-point readings from nearly 8,000 "citizen scientists" across the UK, and 66% of these data-points showed poor water quality, with unacceptable levels of nutrient pollution.

England showed the worst water quality in the UK this April, 74% of sites tested had unacceptable levels of nutrient pollution.

The Thames and Anglian river basin districts, and the counties of the East Riding of Yorkshire, and Rutland have the worst water quality in the UK, with 86% of measurements showing unacceptable levels of nutrient pollution; closely followed by Oxfordshire and Hertfordshire.

The Neagh Bann river basin district in Northern Ireland, the Scottish counties of Roxburgh, Ettrick and Lauderdale, Ross and Cromarty, Inverness and Kirkcudbrightshire have the best water quality in the U.K. 24% of data points across the UK show E. coli levels that would classify as poor (were the sites to be given bathing water status) with significant regional variation.

In Cheshire, 65 data points were analysed. Of these data points, 63% showed unacceptable levels of nutrient pollution. This compares to 74% in England overall, meaning that Cheshire had better than average water quality.



#### Rebuilding the beds.

On Wednesday, 30th April this year, our group set to work to rebuild the two raised flower beds situated at the corner of Crewe Road and Rope Lane, at the request of Wistaston Parish Council.

These beds although of a strong design were constructed many years ago and

unfortunately had started to show signs of decay over the last few years. We used good quality timber that had been pressure treated, supplied by the council using corrosion resistant coach bolts, galvanised nails and PVC linings. We are confident that the beds will last for many years and give pleasure to both residents and visitors to our village.

On Thursday, 22nd May, we carried out similar work on the raised flower bed at the corner of Wistaston Green Road and Beech Drive. This bed of a



similar design was reconstructed in the same manner, using the same type of materials.

We never mind doing work of this kind, that is markedly different to our normal work as we know it is appreciated and enhances the appearance of our village.

If anyone would like to discuss with us the work we do, or suggest

future projects they will find us working each Monday morning usually in the Joey the Swan area. We start at 9.30am and finish slightly after mid-day. Our exact location may be found on our website, or displayed on the notice board at the Church Lane entrance.

## Wistaston Memorial Hall and Community Centre



#### **General Update**

On the 1st of October 2024, Wistaston Memorial Hall and Community Centre incorporated itself as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation(CIO) and is now formally recognised by the above title. The original charity was formally closed in May of this year. This change followed on from the unanimous support of the Wistaston Hall and Community Centre trustees back in March 2023. Thanks are due to members and trustees for the work involved in making this change, a change that allows the hall to manage its assets and activities much more efficiently. The change itself has no impact on hirers of the hall, agreed arrangements continuing as normal.

On the subject of hall hire, the Crewe Concert Band will be performing 'An Afternoon of Remembrance' concert in the hall on Saturday the 8th of November at 2pm, followed on Sunday by our annual Remembrance service at the hall at 3pm.

Finally, we are working on improving security at the Hall and have installed CCTV as an initial step.

Rebuild Update -Community Consultation on proposed new Hall plans



Throughout August

the proposed plans for the new Hall were on display in the Armitage Hall and the 2 meeting rooms. We held 2 Open Days on Tuesday 12th August and Saturday 16th August to provide the opportunity for user groups and the local community to view and discuss the plans with the Hall Trustees. Both sessions were well attended and our architect Clive Tucker was there to answer questions on the Tuesday. Visitors were encouraged to provide feedback on the plans using the paper comment forms available in the Hall or by completing the electronic version using the link on our Rebuild Project website page.

The plans are still available to view on our Rebuild Project page. The closing date for feedback is 12<sup>th</sup> September 2025 so you still have time to share your thoughts with us. We will review feedback and finalise the plans, responding to all suggestions where requested.

There is still a long journey ahead of us, starting with obtaining planning permission and seeking funding before we have to say a fond farewell to our existing Hall. Timescales will become clearer as we progress through 2025.

#### Services 51, 52 and 53 changed from the 21st July 2025.

The changes are being made following feedback during our first few months of operating these new services.

The route between Leighton Hospital and Nantwich will be changing with all buses operating via Wistaston and now serving Birchin Lane in Nantwich. Sainsbury's will no longer be served, but can still be accessed by changing to service 85 at Nantwich Bus Station.

Buses on service 51 will only run on schooldays. On Saturdays and during school holidays buses will instead run as service 52 to provide additional journeys via Millfields.

## Issue number 179 NATURE ARTICLE

27 April and a fox through the garden in daylight hours, sniffing under the conifer before a quick departure. End of April and no parental activity observed among the birds. No house sparrows in sparrow terrace, bees occupying it instead. Blue, brimstone and orange-tip butterflies made a brief presence, with fewer than usual whites. Trevor noticed a downturn in the number of buzzards, but, checking with the local ornithological society, was told there was no problem.

May, and swifts were heard, here at last for their short season with us. Around the pond and neighbouring hedge both a small red and small blue damselfly, perhaps the tiniest members of their family, made fleeting visits early in the month. Mid May a blackbird was gathering nest material and a wood pigeon chose straws of grass with, no doubt, same idea in mind, but, as time went by, no chicks of any species were seen, which is odd: perhaps it's all still waiting to happen. Climate change might mean the food supply was not in evidence at the appointed time. 19 May and a small tortoiseshell butterfly from the Booths who had seen none last year – and on 20th a painted lady. This latter comes to us for the summer from Africa and southern Europe, but, despite breeding, it does not expect to survive northern winters. Small tortoiseshells are regarded as common, hibernating in buildings during winter and producing at least two broods a year.

Another declining species, the stock dove, was reported by Joyce and Andrew Booth, mid June. This bird relies on farmland's stubble fields and it is thought that agricultural chemicals are one cause of the decline. A collared dove, seen by us around the same time, is a rare sighting, numbers settling down after the explosion in Britain from across Europe in the early fifties. The best sighting for the Booths has to be 21 June when a red kite flew over Freshfields, harried by two black-headed gulls. This magnificent swallow-tailed raptor, once rare, is seen more and more often away from its strongholds of Scotland and Wales.

Also in June, Jean and Dennis Buchanan disturbed a scarlet tiger moth which flew towards Joey the Swan. Next day it stayed an hour on their laurel hedge, able to be photographed. The Buchanans read that in Britain this moth is confined to east Kent and south west England and Wales, populations very local. It frequents riverbanks, wet meadows, coast and marshy ground. Is global warming expanding its range? Our comma butterfly of 19 June can hardly compete!

July brought return of a ring-necked parakeet to the village, on 8th one landing in a tree behind Margaret Skerratt while she was talking to a friend. It stayed in one spot for half an hour, long enough for a photograph.


