
Presentation to Ian Gould and introduction to Dane Chaplow



Nature Roundabout

Only by a whisker did Dave O'Hara miss the last article with his report of a little egret in the vicinity of the two streams at the Joey the Swan recreation ground on 11 January. Dave saw the bird land, move towards the sewer overflow, then fly back upstream. It fed on the stream till an influx of people disturbed it, at which point it flew into an adjoining field to feed till just short of noon. The whole visit lasted four hours. An earlier article records an egret along the stream beyond the Millennium Bridge, and we recall Dave saying he guessed it would only be a matter of time before one turned up here.

On 20 January an email from Allan Scholes (Broughton Lane) mentioned a buzzard as a frequent percher in a tree at the bottom of either his garden or one over the brook. Jackdaws have harassed the bird and it has not been seen since New Year. However, Allan still enjoys the company of a variety of tits and goldfinches on his many feeders, and twice-weekly visits from a male sparrowhawk. A kingfisher flies along the brook, seen also by neighbours, and a large fox is often present by day, sniffing and wandering about in nonchalant mood. Allan does not mention holes in his lawn: maybe he's been fortunate.

As to the more uncommon visitors, Derek Owen (Wistaston Green Road) had a female blackcap in his garden (22 Feb), with a brief sighting the previous week; the female, of course, sporting the 'brown' cap.

Three redpolls joined goldfinches at our niger stations in early February and have arrived spasmodically ever since. It is quite special to see these tiny finches with their subdued flush of rosiness.

Two dates in March brought in the treat of a brambling. It can be a challenge to find these in an assorted finch flock as they are not dissimilar to chaffinches. The orangey breast and mottled head and back, especially in the male, plus a white rump revealed in flight, are give-aways. These attractive birds overwinter here from their breeding grounds in Siberia and Scandinavia, mixing with other finches, to feed principally on seed or grain.

On 13 March Mrs. Buchanan (Clare Drive) had a waxwing in her garden for twenty minutes and Christine Howarth (Broughton Lane) had one on 26th. Either through population explosions, or shortage of favoured berries, there are winters which see mass eruptions of these invaders from their breeding grounds of northern Europe, and this year has been a pretty good 'waxwing winter' as it is known.

These erratic incursions were recorded even in 1679-80, the bird distinctive with its crest and multi-coloured posterior.

Michael and Helen Pierce (Sandylands Park) have kept a log of their frog spawning times over the past fifteen years, the dates falling between late February and mid March. These trends fit in well with the national pattern for 2011 where maximum activity occurs between mid February and late March, peaking in late February. For the Pierces this year was an exception in that there was a gap of sixteen days between spawning dates, whereas the mating has previously been over in three or four days running. The hen pheasant which flew over the Pierce house in

early March would be too late to catch the cock bird we saw in November!

John Wood (Sandringham Drive) struggled to identify the bird which arrived on his fence at 6 a.m., 22 March, and discussions with friends proved it to be a red-legged partridge. A 'first' for Wistaston?

Spring weather is introducing butterflies in the form of small tortoiseshell, peacock and brimstone. Our first ever pair of bullfinches attacked our feeders, 29 March; the scissor-sharpening song of chiffchaff flowing from the hedgerow, 4 April. Roll on summer.

Wistaston Conservation Group

The past few weeks have been great for the Group, wonderful weather, and we have recruited several new members, enabling us to achieve several projects which would not have been possible in the past without employing costly outside assistance.

I would like to thank all our members, both old and new, for all your efforts to make Wistaston the wonderful place it is.

Oak Avenue

We have recently planted several oak trees on the recreation ground, protected by wooden fencing. The "Oak Avenue" has been there for several generations, but the Oak trees are coming to the end of their natural lifespan. The new saplings will help to rejuvenate the line of trees for future generations.

Filter Bed Seat

Despite it's sighting overlooking perhaps the best view in Wistaston, due to a serious litter problem, it was decided to relocate the bench at the top of the filter beds to a position lower down, nearer to the path. This move has now been completed by our members, and we hope that the new location meets with the approval of walkers young and old.

Field Lane Steps

Some years ago the Group, with the assistance of volunteers from the BTCV, improved a very muddy sloping path by cutting steps from Field Lane to the recreation path. Over the years vegetation and wear have somewhat taken over, and the steps were in a poor condition. Our members have now re-cut the steps and cut back the overhanging vegetation, so that walkers can once again use the steps safely.

Whilst carrying out this clearance, the steps from the recreation path into Hinging Bank Covert were also re-cut, and a gully dug alongside, to try to drain the area above, which has been very wet in winter.

Water Voles

There have been several sightings of Water Vole along our streams, so we arranged a training session, led by Andrea Powell of Cheshire Wildlife Trust, so that our members can carry out surveys of our area to establish whether we have a resident population of Water Vole in Wistaston.

Any sightings would be appreciated, either to me on 661066, or direct to Cheshire Wildlife Trust, on $01\,948\,820728$.

Litter

During March our members carried out a litter pick along the paths from the Rising Sun to Wistaston Green Road, and then on to Joey the Swan. In 2 hours we picked up so much litter that it filled the boot of my car.

It was evident that the area under the watchful eye of David O'Hara, the P.C. Warden, had a lot less litter than the rest of the path areas; well done David, keep it up.



Almost all the litter is packaging of some sort, cigarette packets, drinks bottles and cans, plastic bags, etc.

To those who drop the litter, you were happy to carry the full pack with you, so why not put the empty pack back in your pocket or bag, and deposit it in a litter bin, either out there or back at home, PLEASE.

Litter spoils our wonderful surroundings, and can jeopardize wildlife.

Future projects

As we now have more active members, we have an on-going programme of projects, but more of these in the next issue.

Despite our increased membership, we would still welcome anyone who loves our natural surroundings, and could give just a bit of their time to improving it even more. You don't need to wield a spade, your knowledge of all things to do with wildlife would be an invaluable asset to the Group.

As stated in the last issue, we are still looking for a Secretary for the Group, so if you love our surroundings and can write a good letter, we would love to hear from you.

Baffled Businessmen & Worried Workers

All of our previous articles have discussed matters relating to estate planning and I thought we might have a change of subject this time and have a general look at a solicitor's role in employment matters. I am indebted to Lesley Smith, a partner at the firm and specialist in employment cases, for her time.

Lesley, do employment related matters take up a lot of your time?

Whilst I do practise in other areas, employment issues do occupy a significant proportion of my week.

Do you represent employers or employees?Both, but obviously not in the same case.

So you don't have a preference or specialism then?

No, and there is no need. Employment law encompasses the rights and responsibilities of both employer and employee, and covers everything from the initial recruitment process through to termination of employment, for whatever reason. We become involved when either side feel they have a problem where the other is not acting in a reasonable manner in line with relevant guidance and legislation.

So what can you do for an employer?

The rules can often be more onerous for smaller employers, who will probably have enough on their plate in keeping their business running and their accounts up to date, without having to become familiar with the fine detail of employment law. It can even be difficult for larger employers as the rules are constantly changing! In many cases, contracts of employment are not drafted correctly or issued to the employee at the required time or at all. That can cause untold problems later on. Similarly, if disciplinary or redundancy action is required then there are certain procedures which must be followed by employers, and many can find themselves caught out.

I would imagine that there could be a lot of people out there who have a business that is increasingly successful, taking up more and more of their time, but they are unwilling to employ help because of all the paperwork and possible complications.

I am sure there are. We work with a number of employers of various sizes on what could be called a "call us when needed" basis. We may not hear from them for a year or more and then we are asked to draw up a new contract of employment or advise on a particular issue with an employee.

Put another way, you provide a sort of ad-hoc Human Resource Department service, or, as I have always called them, Personnel.

That is certainly the case in terms of employment law,

procedures and advice on employers' rights and obligations. Of course, we can also act in relation to leases of commercial premises, debt recovery, licensing agreements, and commercial contracts and offer a range of other services to support businesses.

What about the employee who feels that they have been mistreated, then? I suppose the possible problems are too varied to be specific?

Yes, I have advised employees about wide-ranging queries and concerns, including bullying in the workplace and unlawful deductions from salary. Cases often relate to either the application of the terms of employment, or the relevant guidance and legislation not being adhered to on termination of employment, whether that is by dismissal, redundancy or constructive dismissal. (Constructive dismissal is where an employee resigns because of the unfair way in which the employer has treated him or her and, if the situation has been bad enough for the employee, the resignation is treated as a dismissal entitling the employee to bring a claim).

I suppose all of this is where Employment Tribunal becomes relevant?

That may be the case for some disputes, but it is by no means inevitable. Often, we can work with the other party, investigate the facts, conduct negotiations on our Client's behalf and reach a suitable agreement to settle the claim to avoid having to pursue a Tribunal complaint. When acting for an employee I often advise that a formal grievance is raised in the first instance. An employer should then deal with that grievance by following a set procedure, including holding a meeting with the employee to try to resolve the problem.

So what advice would you give to anyone who is experiencing problems at work?

The first thing to do is familiarise yourself with your rights and responsibilities. These are readily available from the Government's own website, www.direct.gov.uk. A helpful site for employers is www.Businesslink.gov.uk. In terms of dismissals and grievances, there are set procedures which both employers and employees ought to follow to ensure that they are not penalised should the dispute reach the Tribunal

An important piece of general advice, whether you are an employee or an employer, is to keep accurate records. These could include letters, emails, minutes of meetings, conversations or events, together with the names of anyone else who was present.

And then?

If you feel that you have a problem for which you need legal support, then you need to see someone sooner rather than later. There are strict deadlines for bringing complaints to the Employment Tribunal but, regardless of that, a workplace dispute can often be resolved much more amicably if it is handled properly and promptly.

Is it expensive to seek legal support?

It is important to stress the need to take advice early, whether about preparing key documents, such as contracts of employment, or how to deal with a problem that has arisen. Too often we are instructed by a client whose problem has been caused, or worsened, by not taking proper advice in the first place. Sadly this is frequently because of a wish not to incur legal fees, yet that omission then causes significantly higher fees to be incurred when something goes wrong.

We offer a free 30 minute consultation which allows the potential client to present their problem and the solicitor to assess the situation and advise on possible action, together with the potential benefits and costs of that action. I, and my colleague, Carina Pennant-Williams, are very happy to see people on this basis.

We will be back in the next "Roundabout" looking at another legal issue.

A crying baby resulted in the formation of the South Cheshire 'George Formby' Ukulele Society. It was late in November 1994 when four ukulele enthusiasts last met to practise in a Wistaston house. It would have been unfair to the couple who lived next door for us to carry on, so we booked the Wistaston Memorial Hall; a warm, welcoming and friendly place.

It was decided that we should put on a monthly variety concert. It was to be a unique organisation that had no registered members, no fees to pay apart from a small amount just enough to cover the cost of the room and refreshments. The amount decided upon was just fifty pence per performance and that figure has not changed over the last sixteen years. It certainly will not be changing as a result of the present economic crisis. Our main wish was to create a friendly organisation where people could meet new friends and have a fun night. This was soon achieved. We have no prima donnas, all artistes are treated the same whether novices or established performers. It has been said that we are the 'best fifty pence worth of entertainment in the world!' That appears to be a very wild statement but no-one has yet offered any suggestions to prove otherwise.

George Formby died at the age of fifty-six and this year is the fiftieth anniversary of his death. George was so popular that when he died over 100,000 turned out for his funeral in Warrington. He was a very approachable and patriotic person who worked wonders for our forces by touring with ENSA during WW2. He entertained millions of troops and they all loved him; without exception photographs show happy smiling faces when they were being entertained by George. He made 22 films and had a repertoire

of well over 200 songs. We do not just play Formby songs but we generally perform songs in the same style and period to ensure our audiences have a great night out.

We have entertained several times over the years. on the stage of the Crewe Lyceum and have been ever present over the last fourteen years at the Nantwich Jazz, Blues and Music Festival where we always perform to large audiences. We have given concerts all over the Crewe area and have entertained old soldiers on the Normandy beaches at Arramanche on an Anniversary of D.Day; whilst there a lady came to us and said that they had a George Formby Group in her village; we asked where she came from and she said Wistaston! Her name was Barbara Brereton. We have also entertained the British Legion in Caen, France; won a major prize in an International Busking Festival in Youghal near Cork in the Republic of Ireland as well as street busking in France and entertaining on the river boats in Amsterdam

We must have entertained thousands of people in the Wistaston Memorial Hall over the past sixteen years. So if you haven't already seen us and you fancy a great night out then we will be there waiting to welcome you on the fourth Friday of every month; curtain up at 7.40 prompt. We do know that you will be very pleasantly surprised.



The Wistaston Estate was sold in 1919

(Part One)

When Brigadier-General Edward Walthall DSO decided to return to the family estate in Alton, Derbyshire, the Wistaston estate was divided into 42 lots and they were sold by public auction at the Royal Hotel, Crewe on Wednesday 28th May 1919 starting at 2:30pm. The auctioneers were Henry Manley & Sons Ltd, of Crewe, the estate agent was John Loring of Doddington, Nantwich and the solicitors were Messrs Rawle, Johnstone & Co of 1 Bedford Row, London.

In the catalogue of the sale, the printers Wilmot Eardley Ltd of Crewe, made some general observations about Wistaston Estate:

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS. 1919

The Wistaston Estate immediately adjoins the Borough of Crewe, while it is also in close contiguity to the old established market town of Nantwich.

Exceptional railway facilities are within easy access to the respective Lots to be offered.

An excellent and improving service of Motor Buses run at frequent periods daily through the Estate in addition to a public Water service and a public Sewerage system.

The agricultural land, from a standpoint of fertility and productiveness, equals any situate in South or West Cheshire.

The Estate generally, outside its existing agricultural commercial, and residential values contains a quantity of the best building sites in the County which are ripe for development.

The valuable growing timber will be included in the purchase price of the respective Lots.

Lot 33 was Wistaston Hall adjoining Broughton Lane and Church Lane, described as a delightful ivy-clad country residence with extensive pleasure grounds, gardens and stabling and a pair of new model cottages. The total area was 14 acres 1 rood and 9 perches. The property occupies an elevated position and commands extensive views over one of the most picturesque portions of Cheshire, being partially surrounded by a belt of magnificent trees and affords a peaceful seclusion. The hall is an excellently designed and substantially built brick and stone edifice with tile roofs, commodious and conveniently arranged and is approached by a short well-formed gravel drive from the highway (Broughton Lane). Bidding reached £2,100, but it was withdrawn from sale. It was afterwards sold to Mr Foden for £2,500. The total area of 14.305 acres had a tithe apportionment of £2:0s:8d.

Areas of land in 1919 were based on acres, roods, perches, square yards etc. Can you complete the following details?

sq. yds = 1 rod, pole or perchperches = 1 roodroods = 1 acreacres = 1 square mile.

Part Two of this account will outline the sale of ten farms which had been rented from the Walthall estate up to 1919. Most of these farmsteads were purchased at the sale/auction by the tenants who had rented them.

WALKING FOOTPATHS

The footpath map in Roundabout 120 is but a small portion of the Definitive Map of Public Rights of Way. These maps cover virtually the whole country. Like Cheshire East many Highway Authorities publish them on their websites.

Rights of Way, mainly footpaths and Bridleways, are most usefully shown on Ordnance Survey maps, "Explorer" at 1:25000, less usefully "Landranger" at 1:50000 scales. These are available at good booksellers and 'outdoor' shops.

For anyone wishing to explore but perhaps a little reluctant to set off alone there are many groups, more or less organised, who arrange walking programmes, some assist the councils with path maintenance.

The major organisations in the field are The Ramblers (www.ramblers.org.uk) the national body promoting walking and access, The Mid Cheshire Footpath Society (www.mcfs.org.uk) and The Peak & Northern Footpaths Society (www.peakandnorthern.org.uk). The first two have extensive walking programmes, all three undertake physical and administrative work to protect and improve the path network.

In addition there are a considerable number of local groups concerned with organising walks of a variety of difficulty, or none!





The following is the original article written by John White with the information he already had

Whilst sorting through some photographs recently, I came across this photograph and would like to know who the ladies were and why they were there. What was the event?

I know that the photograph was taken in the back garden of 12 Westfield Drive, Wistaston and the lady kneeling on the lawn was Mrs Pauline Hardy, the first wife of Mr Fred Hardy BSc (Hons), a significant engineer in the development of the Merlin engine for Spitfires and the Cromwell tank at the Rolls-Royce factory in Crewe. 

Wistaston Green Townswomen's Guild

As mentioned previously, the Guild's aim is to educate and we certainly achieved that in February. Mr Steve Manning delivered a talk on orchidaceae. No dumbing down here! Full tongue-twisting botanical names were used throughout.

He told us how he came to be addicted to orchids after he arrived in Cheshire and meeting a neighbour who opened his eyes to a new world. Wondering if a dilapidated greenhouse would become an insurance claim during some incredible storm he soon realised that as it would not give in gracefully he decided to renovate it instead. Because it had a wall bordering his neighbour's land he decided to inform him of his intention to do the work and ask his permission to do so, during this conversation he was asked what he intended to grow in it and was promptly taken on a tour of his garden. That was the beginning, never had Steve seen so many orchids in all his life – the seed was planted!

Ile informed us that a great proportion of the world was capable of growing orchids. In the tropical forests they use the vegetation as supports and become terrestrial, more like the orchids we know and protect. He now has over 2000 in his collection and showed us many excellent photographs. We were amazed at the beauty and complexity of these incredible plants. We are, perhaps, familiar with some of the varieties that look like faces, or even people. We learnt about the imaginative and ingenious ways in which they reproduce with the aid of insects. Mankind still has a long way to go to catch up with nature – it will always be that one step ahead.

Our AGM in March was followed by an excellent fish and chip supper supplied by the local chippy in Bramhall Road which was enjoyed by all. We were delighted to be able to wish Betty Morris congratulations on her 90th birthday and she was presented with a beautiful bouquet of tulips.

Our Federation also held their annual afternoon tea in March. This year was a new venue at the Festival Park in Hanley which was a great improvement over that previously used. The very spacious ballroom was filled with over 200 ladies. We were very honoured to have our National Chairman as our guest and she said it was the largest group she had had the privilege to visit during her term of office so far. She congratulated her predecessor on her stamina and hard work and concurred that it was necessary to put one's own life on hold and was hoping to keep up the pace.

Our speaker for the event was Adam Partridge whose talk was mainly anecdotal and humorous. He commenced with his experience of receiving Christmas cards by the shed load consisting of partridges and pear trees. Perhaps we should bear this in mind when we think we are being appropriate with our choice. He had many tales to tell of the reasons people want to sell their treasures – downsizing, would like someone else to have the pleasure, don't like it, want to treat the grandchildren, pay for plastic surgery etc. He was always sad to see people wanting to sell war medals. One has to acquire the art of letting people down gently

when the article is worth far less than they anticipated. Tea services, although perfect will rarely fetch a high price. One hopeful had brought along a set of fish knives and forks, engraved with a fish – he asked what they were used for! How times have changed. At the moment silver, gold and Chinese artefacts are all good collectables. Commemorative items are very often not worth a lot due to the high production as are those produced at the wrong time with incorrect information – such as an Edward VIII mug, Charles & Camilla changed their wedding date leaving a great deal of stock and worthless.

At our April meeting Elsie Whalley presented Ruth Bush with the President's badge along with a beautiful bouquet – very well deserved. Ruth has been a dedicated member of the Guild and committee for some considerable time and worked very hard for its success; we hope she enjoys her term of office.

Our speaker for the evening was Robert Wheatley. Whilst we expected an interesting talk on antiques we were treated to an informative and hilarious session. The Victorian period was one of great activity and progress resulting in the emergence of the middle classes who wanted to emulate the rich. To demonstrate this he had many excellent pieces of silverware and in particular a solid silver teapot made in 1838. Robert has a great love, not only of his precious collection, but of history which brought all the pieces to life, each one having a story of its own relative to the period in which it was produced. He showed us a Moorcroft ashtray dated around 1929-36 produced for a liner in Barrow in Furness, early Moorcroft being very valuable. He had many pieces from the early century which were in mint condition.

Robert gave us a very entertaining and educational talk interspersed with three poems which he recited with great aplomb. Amongst all these very valuable pieces was a small brass photo stand from his childhood home which proves that money is not the only value we should place on pieces, sentimental pieces are priceless too. It was very refreshing to hear that although he left Crewe many years ago he was always pleased to return to his birthplace. He was also slightly amused to say that someone had parked in what used to be his family's garden in Thomas Street – making it rather sad to think that most of what was Crewe has been demolished and perhaps we should all work a little harder to preserve our locality before we too find our garden has now become a car park!

Our thanks must go to Jean Stubbs for producing a wonderful Simnel cake which was raffled for the charity for Pancreatic Cancer raising a generous amount.
