Wistaston & District Flower Club 50th anniversary ~ 1961 to 2011

The National Association of Flower Arrangement Societies (NAFAS) was formed in 1959. At a public meeting, instigated by Mrs Elsie Gibbons and held on 3rd May 1961, the Wistaston & District Flower Club was formed. Mrs Boughey was elected President and Mrs Furmston was elected Chairwoman. Vice-President was Mrs Jenna, Secretary Mrs Butler, Treasurer Mrs Addison, Programme Secretary Mrs Proudlove. Committee Members were Mesdames Jobson, Slack, Slight, Wilks, Williams, Wright, Robinson and Miss Clare. By 1962 the Club had 86 members and this has increased to $130\,\mathrm{in}\,2011$. We have two members - Miss Margaret Cope and Mrs Christine Harper - who joined Flower Club in 1962 and are still members today - what an achievement! There are others who are still members of the club from the 1970's and have given excellent service. We have two honorary members Mrs Beryl Lees and Mrs Joan Bentley.

On 25th July 1961, the North West Midlands and North Wales Area of NAFAS welcomed Wistaston & District Flower Club into the above Association. In 1970 the Area was divided and Wistaston elected to

join Mercia & North Wales Area.

In 1965 Mrs Slack very kindly donated a silver cup to the Club to stimulate interest in the club competition. Over the years other trophies were presented to the club in memory of past committee members. The Iris Wright Rose Bowl, The Miss Clare Trophy, The Mrs McCutcheon Trophy, The Barbara Jolley Salver, The Doris Bimson Salver and the Colin Lindop Trophy. In 1987 a Scroll of Honour for past officers was given in memory of Mrs Atkins. The scroll hangs in the Wistaston Memorial Hall today. In 1966 the committee elected to cater for a Cheese & Wine Luncheon prior to the AGM. Never had so many members been seen at an AGM before!

In 1967 Wistaston took over the running of the Floral Art Section at Nantwich Agricultural Show. In 1988 we presented a cup for "Best in Show" competition. In 1989 Nantwich Flower Club joined us in running the event until 1991 since which time

we have always assisted.

In 1972 when the Queen opened Leighton Hospital we were delighted to be asked to design the floral arrangements for the special occasion. For the Queen's Jubilee in 1977 the club celebrated with a Cream Tea. It is now an annual event with scones traditionally made by committee members.

The club has a wide range of activities in its programme each year including monthly demonstrations by either National or Area Demonstrators, Workshops, Coffee Mornings, Day Trips and visits to National Shows. All very much enjoyed.

Many charities have benefited from our fundraising events and the committee wishes this to continue.

We have participated in local Church Flower Festivals together with Chirk Castle, Lichfield and Chester Cathedrals. All the special anniversaries of the club have been celebrated in style as our photographic record shows.

Reaseheath College

Tree planting by Reaseheath students to mark the Queen's Diamond Jubilee

Several hundred young trees have been planted on a new rural corridor linking Crewe and Nantwich to commemorate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

The trees were obtained by The Rotary Club of Crewe & Nantwich Weaver and planted by arboriculture students from Reaseheath College, Nantwich, on the Crewe-Nantwich Greenway near the A530 Middlewich Road, Wistaston on Wednesday 25 January.

It is hoped that the mix of native species, which include hawthorn, blackthorn, field maple, birch and oak, will grow into a wood which will benefit the local community and its wildlife for years to come.

The Rotary Club acquired the trees in a Community Tree Pack from the Woodland Trust which is giving away free trees as part of its Jubilee Woods project to mark the 60 years which the Queen has served as monarch. The group also plans to plant a Royal Oak sapling - grown from an acorn gathered from a royal estate – in Church Square in Nantwich town centre.

The Rotary Club also wants the tree planting to commemorate a second significant local event – the Great Fire of Nantwich in 1583 – when Queen Elizabeth 1 played a major part in helping to rebuild the town.

Explained Rotary Club Community and Vocational Committee Chair Neil Brown: "The main objective of Rotary is service - in the community, in the workplace, and throughout the world - so it's great to be able to both mark the Diamond Jubilee and pay tribute to Elizabeth I. There's a great royal tradition in the area and we hope the trees we plant will last hundreds of years."

The trees have been planted on land owned by Cheshire East Council near to the Rising Sun public house. The site is part of the Crewe-to-Nantwich Greenway, a rural corridor linking Nantwich's riverside walks with Crewe's historic Queen's Park along the A530 corridor. The project,

which should be completed in Summer this year, is aimed at offering cyclists and walkers a trafficfree link between the two towns.

The Greenway will be added to the 13,000 miles of Sustrans' National Cycle Network, which is developing new walking and cycling routes across the UK.

The tree planting is being supported by the Wistaston Parish Council and by Wistaston Conservation Group, who are responsible for the adjoining public land and take a proactive interest in conserving and establishing woodland and other areas for wildlife.

Final year Level 3 Forestry and Arboriculture students at Reaseheath College carried out the planting. Megan Poole, aged 28, said: "It's been great knowing that if we come back in 20 years we'll find a woodland community benefitting both the wildlife and the local community."

Wistaston Conservation Group

The last months have seen the Group working hard in the area and a lot of good work has been achieved. Unfortunately, as you will note below, certain other local inhabitants do not seem to share our aims to keep Wistaston's natural features in good condition for the benefit of future generations.

Tree planting

We were very fortunate in being awarded 430 tree whips by the Woodland Trust for us to plant to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

As the majority of the trees in the Old Covert woodland are getting on in years, it was decided to plant the majority of our new trees in that area, so that the woodland would regenerate, and be good for years to come.

To this end, our working party planted about 300 of the whips around the Old Covert woodland, and all seemed well. However, about a week later, some mindless individuals decided that they did not like what we had done, and destroyed about 75% of the trees we had planted. We have since tried replanting those which were not too damaged, but their chances of survival are low, and we can no longer look forward to the regeneration we planned, to celebrate the Royal event.

Pond work

A lot of work has been done to improve the pond in Rookery Bank Covert which had been badly silted up, and overgrown, to the extent that there was virtually no water in the pond, and the pond was in total shade all the year.

The Group has achieved several objectives to improve this situation:

- cut back a lot of the overhanging foliage to allow more light to get to the water
- dug out the silt to a depth of about 12 inches to allow more water, to encourage more aquatic species
- constructed a bund around the pond, using only natural materials cut or dug from the area, to better contain the water in the pond
- 4. cleared all the inlet and outlet streams, so that, in future more water will keep the pond topped up
- planted various native species, including flag iris, to improve the surroundings, and provide more colour to the area.

We are already seeing more wildlife around the pond area, and hope that, when the water and vegetation has had a chance to settle, even more species will make the pond their home.

Stream/drain clearance

A lot of work has been done in the Old Covert area to free the streams which drain down from the houses on the Beech Drive estate, land drainage only, and



feed into the Wistaston Brook. Again, all these have been badly silted up to the extent that all the areas were boggy, and very little water managed to find its way as far as the brook.

The Group has now cleared these streams, and water is again flowing freely. This job will need to be done on a regular basis due to the amount of leaf detritus, and the very soft nature of the soil in the area.

Projects for 2012

We have several projects planned for 2012:

- planting the "Tree Warden" trees, which are donated by Cheshire Landscape Trust to our local tree wardens to improve our local woodland
- continuing our litter picking along the local paths. PLEASE take your litter home for disposal, or put it in a local litter bin, rather than leaving it for volunteers to have to spend time removing.
- we are working with the Parish Council to improve the Woodside woodland, and the paths in that area
- we are again continuing to control invasive species in the Joey-the-Swan area, with specific emphasis on Himalayan Balsam, a never ending task.

Thanks

Most of the above work has entailed heavy, back-breaking work, which has been carried out by our members on a completely voluntary basis. I would like to thank them all for their efforts, on behalf of all the people of Wistaston.

I am again pleased to report that we have recruited several new members, and our Group number is now above 20, allowing us to consider more, and bigger, projects. We are always ready to welcome anyone who shares our aims "to keep Wistaston's natural features for future generations".



Nature article

Last time's foxy tale prompted both Jonathan White and Eileen Bamber to recount their own stories. The week commencing 9 October Jonathan saw a fox twice at the Joey the Swan end of Broughton Lane. It crossed in front of him into Wistaston Park. Earlier on Eileen saw a fox around midnight, at the top of the drive across from her, in Broughton Lane. It was motionless in the full light of the street-lamp and was still there when Eileen returned from putting her bin at the gate.

1 October remains our last personal swallow sighting and the anticipated overwintering chiffchaff has fallen silent. A sparrowhawk, at home, on 29 October, was eyeing the now dozen or so house sparrows regularly gathering on back-garden bushes. A burgeoning hedgerow of thick shrubs has served to increase sparrow numbers markedly. It is a daily rendezvous for socialising in sight of a quick nip across lawn to food at a collapsing bird-table. We have read that the original home of house sparrows is Africa and that it is likely they were introduced to Britain by our first farming ancestors, proceeding to spread all over Europe.

We noted fieldfares over-flying first on 9 November: a well-spaced flock of about eight, their rapid wing-beats alternating with pauses, and their constant chattering, diagnostic. 20 December saw lots descend upon the allotment trees beside Sandylands Park, before quickly moving on.

We played host to a mini invasion of starlings one day in November, both on the fat-block and on the ground for spillages, but only because we'd trimmed off the blackened surfaces of the block. It is important to ensure such food is clean and presentable since birds, as humans, like their food to look palatable. It is easy to forget about hangers of seed and nut mixes and to wonder why they are neglected. Once dampness takes a hold food soon becomes congealed and compacted and will not flow freely, so a regular shake of containers is recommendable.

Since before Christmas a cock pheasant has kept a regular presence in Sandylands Park. Recorded in Britain in 1059, its true home is Asia; birds from the western part of this range, the Caucasus. being introduced here and bearing the nomenclature: 'Old English Pheasant'. From the eighteenth century there were repeated introductions from eastern Asia of forms with a white neck-ring. Although reared for the shooting season there is a well-established wild breeding species in assorted habitats

• Church involvement - Sheena began worshipping at St Mary's Church, Wistaston in 1974. She has been involved in Sunday School classes and Rose Queen events for many years. She is a member of the Mothers' Union and the Ladies' Evening group. Sheena has initiated and organised special foods, including soup, for Lent as well as charity lunches and suppers. She is a graduate of the Bishop's Course in Christian Life and Faith and has been a group leader on this course. She was commissioned by the Bishop as a Parish Worker in 1999. She assists in Wistaston as a contact for Family Life (Marriage Enrichment). Sheena has been a sides person for many years at St Mary's Church in Wistaston and has been a member of the Parochial Church Council for over eleven years, devoting time to organise many special events. She has been a member of the Deanery Synod for the last seven years. Sheena's voluntary work includes giving valuable and valued support to her husband Ken in his calling as a Priest to the Parish and Community of Wistaston.

•Guiding - from 1975 to 1977 Sheena was Wistaston's uniformed assistant Guide Leader, assisting Mrs Jouce Lustv. From 1977 to 1979 she was Assistant Leader to Wistaston's Ranger Guide unit and was leader from 1979 to 1993. From 1979 to 1983 Sheena was the Guides' Commissioner for the Nantwich division. From 1995 to 1999 she was the Assistant Guide Company leader. From 1999 to the present she has been a member of the Trefoil Guild. During her thirty-six years as a leader Sheena organised every type of Guiding Activity, from overnight hikes locally to week-long camps in the Peak District, the Lake District and Scotland. Activities include cooking, entertainment, hobbies and debates often in conjunction with the Wistaston Woodside Venture Scout Unit. She is always keen to promote good family and Guiding values and provide a listening ear to the teenage queries and quandaries of many young women who have progressed through the Wistaston Ranger Unit. During the time that she was a Ranger

Guide leader Sheena was also an Expedition Trainer and Assessor under the Duke of Edinburgh award scheme. Many of these same young people have since undertaken voluntary positions in Wistaston's community in the wake of Sheena's influence, and inspirational leadership.

• Diabetes Voluntary Group - Sheena is a tireless worker for the cause of Diabetes sufferers in this area. She has been Secretary of the Local group and is now the Honorary President. Every month she hosts the local Group, often providing transport to and from meetings for the less mobile members. She is a relentless fundraiser for this and other local charity events, including the Annual Charity Dinner involving South Cheshire College students, a summer charity stall in her garden selling bedding plants and an Annual Garden Party, at which she provides much homemade produce for the sales tables. It is well supported by Wistaston's people and visited by the Mayor. 



Maureen gives us all timely advice on how to care for our precious feet.

Hell hath no fury like a woman's corn (nor a man's for that matter!)

So what exactly is a corn? Often mis-diagnosed as a verruca, a corn is a 'plug' of hard skin, usually coneshaped, most commonly found on the toes but can also occur in between the toes and on the soles of the feet. Corns usually start off as callouses, which is an area of hard-skin caused by pressure and friction. This is usually due to a shoe rubbing when on the upper part of the foot, toes rubbing against each other in the case of 'soft' corns found in-between the toes and on the soles of the feet by weight-bearing. These types of corns are usually, though not always necessarily, the result of being on one's feet a lot. A person with a high instep (a condition known as pes cavus) can be prone to coms on the ball of the foot and usually fitting the patient with a metatarsal insole will alleviate this problem.

A corn usually feels as though there is a small stone imbedded in the foot and if palpated feels like a small, hard prominence. It is most painful when pressure is exerted on the area and eases off when the foot is rested and shoeless.

So what can be done? The only way to remove a corn permanently is with a scalpel. 'Ouch!' I hear you shout. 'Isn't that painful?' Not at all. We are talking about a 'plug' of hard, dead skin with no nerve endings whatsoever. People talk about corns having 'roots'. This is not dentistry, this is chiropody and, believe me there are no roots involved! The technique used is called 'chiropodist's curve' and the best way to imagine it is by lifting an egg out of an egg-cup with a dessertspoon. Chiropodists use all sorts of peculiarshaped scalpel blades from the straight sort favoured by surgeons to actual tiny spoon-shaped blades. Once the corn has been enucleated, the hollow is painted with an antiseptic and then dressed. The dressing need only remain in situ for 24 – 48 hours. The patient can bathe or shower as normal during this time and usually there is no need to return for further treatment unless the condition recurs which, unfortunately, it quite often can do unless the cause is eliminated.

What should NOT be done. The use of 'cornplasters' is not recommended as these treatments contain a strong caustic called salicylic acid which can actually burn the skin. The packaging carries a warning that the product should not be used by diabetics or anyone suffering from a circulatory disorder. Wise advice indeed. Nor should any attempt be made at self-surgery.

I have had patients tell me all sorts of horror stories about attempted self-removal involving the use of scissors, razor-blades, knives, potato-peelers, cheese-graters and good old-fashioned fingers and nails. At the least this can cause severe bleeding, at the most blood-poisoning!

Always consult a fully-qualified chiropodist/ podiatrist for treatment. The titles 'chiropodist' and 'podiatrist' are protected under law and may not be used unless the practitioner is registered with the Health Professions Council and the only way to remain on this register is to comply with the regulations of obtaining CPD points. This stands for Continual Professional Development and means that, as practitioners, we are obliged to keep up-to-date and informed of any new procedures that have been developed, take courses, attend seminars and regularly read professional journals. If we do not practice for over 12 months we are obliged to be re-tested for competence before we are allowed to re-register. Anyone practising chiropody/podiatry is obliged to have full public liability insurance cover. To check if your practitioner is qualified, go to the HPC website: www.hpccheck.org.

WISTASTON PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

RUDGET

Your Council have completed plans for the coming financial year 2012/13. The cut back in grants by Cheshire East Council last year continues to impact our finances and necessitated changes and restrictions on future plans in order to control costs. Our capital programme for village improvements has again been limited to £1,000. Despite applying minimum increases only where essential we still are faced with a budget shortfall. As a result we are proposing a precept increase of £3,000. This equates to approximately 85 pence per year per household.

WOODLAND CONSERVATION

Our woodlands have again had their annual review and as a result numerous trees required felling in addition to considerable surgery for deadwood removal. This review is essential to ensure safety risks are minimised and to meet a strict criteria applied by the Council's insurers.

In order to keep up our planting programme of replacement trees, our Park Ranger obtained 420 trees from the National Diamond Jubilee initiative. These were planted, however, many have been destroyed by vandals. Regular maintenance is ongoing in order to deter vandals

MEMORIAL FOR THE 1914-18 GREAT WAR - ST. MARY'S CHURCHYARD

No additional letters in support of moving the Memorial have been received, the total to date being 3. In addition Rope Parish Council have supported the view that widespread agreement is essential before considering any move, particularly in view of the potential high cost involved.

ALLOTMENTS

Your Council has continued to request information on detailed proposals for the transfer of the Allotment site from Cheshire East Council. Final proposals, however, have not been received to date. We therefore do not expect this to be resolved by April as originally suggested. Your Council are awaiting Cheshire East Council's proposal before taking any further action.

Wistaston & Rope War Memorial

For the sale of Wistaston Hall by Brigadier General Walthall DSO, the sale brochure (dated May 1919) made reference to 'Church Road' rather than its present designation of 'Church Lane'.

For many years, various bodies have been unable to identify ownership of the triangle of land in front of the Church of St Mary. Looking at the Tithe Map for Wistaston dated 1840 (copy hangs in the Dudley Room, Wistaston Memorial Hall) the triangle is shown as an adjunct of Church Road, there being no line to divide it from the highway. In common with all

highways, it was not numbered for tithe (church tax) purposes. It is probable that future draughtsmen concentrated on the symmetry of Church Road itself, leaving the triangle unattached. If correct, the area still legally belongs to the County Council and will be recorded as such at County Hall, Chester. There may be no 'deeds' as such. It should be feasible for the County Council (or Cheshire East Council) to donate this land to the people of Wistaston for their own use.

Wistaston Green Townswomen's Guild

In November Mr T Butler gave a presentation of his experiences of working for British Rail and in particular his organisation of visits involving the Royal train. He worked at Rail House and retired after 40 years, 25 of which had been planning royal rail travel. He has raised over £5,000 for the very worthy Railway Children's Charity with his amusing and informative talks. He went back to Queen Victoria's time when travel was exceptionally slow and would take as long as 24 hours to get to Balmoral. There were no facilities on the train and stops were frequent for sleep, comfort and food. Victoria spent a night at Crewe Arms and special arrangements were made. Due to her lack of agility it is recorded that a tunnel was built from the station to the hotel to avoid the use of the steps but apparently it was never used. Today's train speed is lower than the scheduled services. When royalty come to Crewe and district they frequently stay overnight in North Wales, somewhere quiet and in the open for security purposes. Nine coaches are required when the Queen travels and there is a royal baggage master. There are double doors in the centre of the train and it has to stop precisely at the red carpet. Absolute timing is the key and all persons to be presented have to line up by this carpet with toes at the edge so it is imperative to get it right - misjudgement equals embarrassment and has happened. Mr Butler related many anecdotes such as when the Queen Mother was seen in a sou'wester and wellies taking a morning constitutional and on another occasion seen by a startled farmer strolling in his corn field. Prince Charles was observed letting his hair down on an overnight stop on another occasion. The royal family are often criticised for their cost of travel but they do in fact pay for the use of the royal train.

In December 2010 the Carol Concert was held in Chester and in November 2011 we hosted an event at Hunters' Lodge Hotel entitled 'More Women of Vision'. Many ladies wore period costume of the early 20^{th} century and some from Nantwich Guild wore suffragette type outfits – white blouses, black skirts and purple and green sashes (the Guild's colours) and of course the ubiquitous hats.

The National Vice Chairman invited four council members to speak on the lives of four women who had contributed a great deal to change the attitude of influential people and without their vision and fortitude no progress would have been made in radically changing the lives of women of the time.

Mary Jones, an illiterate child who was determined to learn to read saved up to buy a bible and eventually walked 25 mountainous miles to Bala to buy one. An annual walk was instituted in recognition of her determination and bravery. She was instrumental in founding the Welsh Bible Society and ensured the protection and survival of the Welsh language.

Elizabeth Fry, a Quaker banker's daughter who after her marriage and many years of childbearing – 12 in all – she travelled widely to press for prison reform and abolition of capital punishment.

Elizabeth Garrett Anderson overcame innumerable obstacles to become a Doctor of Medicine but sadly following her remarkable achievement the law was changed to prevent other women from following in her footsteps. She was a suffragette and advocate for the admission of women to the medical profession.

Dr Elsie Inglis, another suffragette, was born in India of Scottish parents and gained her degree in medicine in 1899 at Edinburgh University and went on to be the first woman to run a maternity hospital in Scotland. She took hospitals to war and served in the Balkans until 1915 when she was captured. The Serbs never forgot her and when she died of cancer in 1917 Serbian Officers were her pall bearers.

In the afternoon we were entertained by Lucy Adlington and her assistant Merry in covering the first 25 years of the 20th century with 'The History Wardrobe'. Whilst narrating the history of the period with the rise of the suffragette movement Merry was dressed piece by piece in clothes of the time. Some of the garments were genuine and others copies, from the corsets and pantaloons to the tiny hand bag in which Merry secreted a long length of chain with which to secure herself to the railings in London. Some of their antics were outrageous but how long would it have taken for women to obtain suffrage if it had not been for these visionaries? The presentation ended with the age of the flapper with garments releasing them from the excruciating cramping of the previous period. It was completely enthralling.

At our December meeting we thanked our Treasurer, Jean Stubbs, for her major contribution to a lovely evening. Not only did she provide three flower arrangements for the raffle but also delicious Christmas cake to enjoy with our tea. To top it all she was our speaker for the evening relating her travellers' tales over a three month solo trip to Australia in December/ January 2010/11. The aim was primarily to see her family in Perth and enjoy an Oz style Christmas with BBQ in a baking 30 degrees C; a nativity in which the three wise men arrived on camels! And also experience an up close and friendly encounter with the indigenous locals of the furry kind. Amongst her souvenirs was the netted hat to keep away those cussed flies. Jean flew to Sydney taking in the iconic Opera House, from there on to Canberra and Melbourne and returning by rail from Adelaide, quite a marathon. Her overall impression was one of cleanliness. Would she go again? You bet.

The Christmas table raised £115 for the local McMillan Nurses.

The annual Christmas lunch was again at Chester but unlike the arctic expedition of last year, it was mild and wet. The theme for this year's event was My Fair Lady with many of the ladies attired for the occasion. The prize went to a group of ladies from a Townswomen's Guild – what a sporty lot.
