Wistaston Community Council was formed from the village group which in 1977 organised the Queen's Silver Jubilee celebration. Three years later in 1980 we awarded the first Wistonian of the Year to Gladys Byrne who had been so instrumental in organising the village Silver Jubilee events. 

### 1. North West in Bloom

We would like to extend the Parish Council's thanks to the Wistaston in Bloom group, Conservation team and supporters who worked hard to win this year's awards.

To win a fourth gold, outstanding award for our Joey the Swan parkland and a first win for the best Town award is a significant achievement.

### 2. Budgets

Your council has started the review for the next financial year. We again will aim to support our organisations who contribute so much to our community.

With increased financial pressures on many we have an overriding target to set no increase in council tax based on a band D property.

Full details of the review will be published for approval in our Jan 2023 Parish meeting.

### 3. Litter

We set out to publish from time to time details on discarded litter which blights our community and to raise awareness of the work done by our volunteer litter picking teams. It is pleasing to see a lower level of discarded dog bags and the absence of face masks.

## Wistaston Church Lane Academy - Report

This term, children in Year 6 have been learning about World War 2. On the 14th October, they went on a visit to Eden Camp. This is made up of huts that tell the story of World War 2. One of the most popular huts was the blitz hut. Here are some quotes about it: "It was very scary, but enjoyable," says Matilda. James says "It was noisy, explosive and fun!"

As well as learning about the huts, they also learnt about the history of Eden Camp - how it was a prisoner of war camp before turning into a museum. A prisoner of war means soldiers that have been captured by the enemy. It was a very interesting trip altogether and Year 6 learnt a lot.

On 18th October, Year 6 had an Evacuee Day. The day was based on all the children who had to leave their homes in World War 2. The day consisted of themed activities such as: a fake air raid, a dance called the Lambeth Walk and writing a letter to their parents. For their lunch, they had sausage casserole and for dessert they had carrot cake (made by the class).

Y6 were dressed up as evacuees for the whole day. They had a gas mask box which people used in the war because of toxic gasses. Evacuees in the olden days had gas mask boxes, ration books and identification passports. When the evacuees left their parents, the police put labels on them so if they got lost they would be given back to the people who were taking care of them.

## Wistaston Village Cricket Club

(Founded 1980)

Where have the last twelve months gone, a phrase often used I know, but it does seem only yesterday since I was writing the prelude to the **2022** cricketing season!! Our cricketing teams have had what could be described as a testing season in general, which the following reports will reflect.

The First Eleven - competing in The Cheshire Cricket League Division 2 had somewhat of a very demanding season, playing in a league with eleven other teams thus creating a total of twenty-two fixtures during the playing season. By the end of the Season playing against some very strong sides their final record was Played 22

Won 1 Lost 21 with a final points total of 46. Some matches were very close and could have had a different result, but I am certain that the team will be stronger from their experience.

The Second Eleven - competing in Division C South/Central had an equally hard season competing with nine other teams. At the end of the season a final record of Played 22 Won 3 Lost 17 with 2 fixtures conceded with a final points total of 58 was recorded. Similarly to the First Eleven, the Second Eleven had some close results.

The Swans XI - The ladies team 'The Swans' playing in Division 3 West of The Cheshire Women's Cricket League played in a smaller group with four other clubs and having played a seasons total of twelve matches finished in fourth position with an overall

A final points total of 111 was acquired.

<u>Under 13</u>'s - our youth team in comparison had a fruitful season playing in a league of eight clubs. At the end of the season of seven fixtures they **Played 7 Won 4**, **Lost 2 and won 1 when their opponents conceded the fixture** gaining **65** points in total and ending runners up just **19 points** behind the Champions **Sandbach**.

<u>Under 11's -</u> contested in a league containing 14 other teams and ended the season with a record of Playing 13 games, Winning 2, Losing 11 with one fixture Cancelled.

<u>Under 9's -</u> Finally but not least our Under 9's also had an extensive playing season of 15 fixtures. Their final tally was Played 14, Won 1 Lost 8 Drew 1 Conceded 2 matches Won 1 by opponents conceding and Tied 1 quite a record.

## **Wistaston Conservation Group**

Hello everyone, Just to keep everyone in touch with what we have been doing lately and hope to do.

### **Cheshire Wildlife Trust - Natural Wellbeing Initiative**

We will soon be having some help with our work in the 'Joey Area' as Cheshire Wildlife Trust have asked if some of their volunteers can join with us to gain experience in what we do while they are taking part in their initiative.

Eventually, we hope this may give our group some more time to carry out work in the more remote parts of our woodland.

Although these parts are well away from the established pathways, we know that visitors like to explore our woodlands, and we must make sure that any potential hazards are neutralized as far as is possible.

### Himalayan Balsam

We have resumed tackling the chronic problem of Himalayan Balsam. We were unable to deal with this matter effectively last year due to the pandemic, and it had again begun to establish itself along the banks of the brook. We have cleared all the plants we could find and in so doing discovered that the water level in the brook was unusually low due to the drought, making it difficult to carry out the annual Duck Race. We cleared out quite a lot of debris that had been washed down during last winter and removed a lot of overgrown vegetation and branches, clearing the way for the race that was extremely well attended.

**Bird Boxes:** One of the members of our group has skilfully made some bird boxes that we have placed near to the Spinney area. It is hoped these will be used in the Spring by nesting birds to boost the songbird population.



### Composting, an aid to nature.

This year we have constructed two

composting bins made from Willow and Hazel cuttings in a shady coppice near to our nursery beds. Successful composting depends on a healthy balance between 'green' materials such as grass cuttings, and 'brown' materials such as tree prunings and woody hedge trimmings as well as fallen leaves, and the introduction of air and moisture by regular turning of the bin contents. This encourages bacteria to feed on the vegetation, breaking it down into the finished compost. One cause of poor results is a failure to turn or mix the contents sufficiently, as is allowing the contents to dry out, preventing bacteria from developing.

We hope to construct another bin nearby when we have the necessary materials available, allowing us to separate-out any partly composted material, to speed-up the process of using the original bins. Eventually, the rich compost will be used in the border beds at the Spinney and Memorial areas.

### Memorial Area Wildflower Meadow.

Whilst clearing the brook we found some large blocks of dressed sandstone and some pieces of concrete partially buried in the stream bed. With great difficulty and a lot of shouting, we removed these and have placed them near to the memorial area adjacent to the Owl statue. The area thus marked out will be sown with wildflower seeds.





### The Queen's Green Canopy.

It seemed appropriate, in view of the recent and very sad demise of our late Sovereign Lady Queen Elizabeth II, to make a brief mention of the **Queen's Green Canopy** initiative that was featured in our article in the Spring edition of 'Roundabout'. This **'Plant a Tree for the Jubilee'** scheme has now been extended until the end of March 2023, and this will allow people to continue to show their appreciation for the Queen's dedication to our nation.

One of our members attended a course on writing grant applications, funded by Cheshire Community Action. A tip from the course was to have a quirky project name to ensure our project stands out from the many other projects requesting funding. We need your help on this, so please send us your suggestions via email or hand in at the Hall. We are looking for local building professionals to assist with specialist technical design, costings and other construction related services. If you have experience in any of these areas, and have time to support the project in the initial design stage, we would love to hear from you.

Since 1964, communities from across the North West have demonstrated their ability to create and maintain attractive environments that benefit residents and visitors alike.



## NATURE ARTICLE

**Mid July** and butterflies too lively in garden to stop to be identified. It is easier to watch bees filching pollen from flowers: antirrhinums, but particularly lavender. The rich orange bands of thorax and abdomen, and buff tail, prominent, are pointers to *Bombus terrestris*, a species noted for building large colonies.

Peace returns to bird-feeding stations now that fledgelings are able to feed themselves and not reliant on parents, so the raucous hunger cries of the crow family have thankfully diminished.

**Earlier in the year** we acquired our own version of Mr. Scruffy – a blackbird resident on our lawn, easily identified by tail missing most of its feathers. As the bulk of our birdlife is jackdaws, rooks and pigeons, this misfit certainly stood apart. As so often happens, one day it was there no more.

**Mid August** and a wood pigeon was seen building a nest in a neighbouring pine, preparatory to laying the anticipated two white eggs in the preferred month of August or September. Broken white eggshells are frequently seen strewn around the garden, but youngsters do appear, following parents for lessons on what to eat. Breeding season largely over, birds can be seen flocking, and late August was our first observation of swallows gathering on wires.

A dainty and pretty form of flax has appeared in two places in our garden this summer: tiny needles of leaves opposite on stem, and a flower of five sky-blue petals with pale centre, fused together. The behaviour of the plant accords with the wording in books: flowers dropping quickly and multiple blooms. A red admiral butterfly, flying around regularly in mid September, would be offspring of migrations from Mediterranean.

On a depressing note, a call in September from Mrs. Temple of Caernarvon Road revealed that neither she nor husband was sighting birds any more despite fully-stocked feeders. As many times stated, it is the corvids and the pigeons that rule the roost in Sandylands Park. Has anyone else noticed a fall-off? The glut of acorns should be attracting the shy jay, but all we get is those pestilential squirrels.

**Late September** and a reappearance of molehills, while windfall rotting pears bring return of long-absent blackbird – but not Mr. Scruffy.

## Do you know your local u3a?

## Caddick Construction help to marshal up fund-raising to help save Wistaston Community parade

Caddick Construction, currently building a new three-storey office for Radius Payment Solutions at Arden Square on Crewe Business Park, has sponsored a training event for local community volunteers.

The Caddick team has agreed to support Wistaston Community Council (WCC) by arranging and funding NRSWA Streetworks' training for the volunteer traffic marshals, securing the future of the village processions, which has been a well-loved feature of village life for more than 40 years.



WCC is a local volunteer fund-raising group which organises local events, including the village fete and a quarterly village magazine. All proceeds are used to support local good causes, local groups and charities working in the community.

The group was originally founded to mark the late Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977 and has been running two local processions for more than 40 years. However, in 2015 health & safety requirements changed, meaning the short road closure for the parades could only be put in place by suitably qualified people, such as a professional traffic management company. This proved to be unaffordable, costing more than the event was raising.

Fortunately, two of the volunteers agreed to undertake the necessary training and marshal the events but that training expired during the Covid pandemic so WCC was again faced with the same dilemma of using a professional traffic management company or funding the re-training itself. Luckily, when the Caddick team heard about the dilemma they stepped in to arrange and fund the training.

Richard Chaplow, Chair of Wistaston Community Council, said: "We are delighted by this exceptional support from the Caddick team, which will enable us to continue running the very popular Rose Queen and Lantern parades, which have been enjoyed by two generations of local families. The help in organising the training and paying for it is hugely appreciated. Professional traffic management costs in the region of £750 per event, which wouldn't be feasible for us. Thanks to the help of the volunteer traffic marshals this support from Caddick will actually be worth over £7,500 to us over the 5-years the marshals are now qualified for, so is hugely significant for us."
