All change at Wistaston Community Council

At our AGM in January, we were very pleased to announce Jonathan White as Wistonian of the Year, a very well-deserved recipient of the award. You will have seen details of this in separate announcements.

The AGM is when the officers to the WCC are elected; these are the Chairman, Vice Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary. On this occasion both Chairman and Vice Chairman have stepped down and a new Chair has been elected.

Dane Chaplow has been Chairman for 12 years and has done an excellent job keeping the Community Council moving in the right direction, not least during the pandemic. As is customary, Dane received the gift of a crystal swan for his long service as Chairman. The enclosed picture shows Vice Chairman Ian Gould making the award to Dane.

Our Vice Chairman has also stepped down; Ian served 11 years previously as Chairman and then after a break served as Vice Chair over the last 8 years. Both Dane and Ian will continue as active members of WCC.

Our huge congratulations go to Nadiah Mckeown who was elected as our new Chair. Nadiah is well known in Wistaston for all the help and support she gave during the Covid lockdown in organising deliveries to the elderly and housebound.

Currently the position of Vice Chairman is vacant, but we hope to fill this shortly and there will still be a wealth of support for Nadiah from the members of WCC.



Wistonian of the Year

Jonathan White, aged 51 from Wistaston, has been awarded Wistonian of the Year for 2022 for which he receives a commemorative shield and badge.

Jonathan began his voluntary community journalism hobby in 2006 and has submitted several hundred stories and photographs relating to Wistaston to the local media, including Wistaston's quarterly 'Roundabout' magazine.



Wistaston events that Jonathan covers include the Village Fete, Model Boat and Duck Race, Fireworks, Wistaston in Bloom, St Mary's Church, Wistaston Jubilee Tennis Club, and events at Wistaston Memorial Hall such as concerts, Remembrance Service and Christmas Fair.

He also writes and takes photographs at events in Crewe, Nantwich, Willaston, Wybunbury and Acton. He estimates he has produced over 2,000 stories in the past seventeen years with more to come in the future. He is also the official club photographer at Nantwich Town Football Club

Jonathan works as a learning support assistant at Cheshire College South and West in Crewe.

Wistaston Community Council was formed from the village group which in 1977 organised the Queen's Silver Jubilee celebration. Three years later in 1980 they awarded the first Wistonian of the Year to Gladys Byrne who had been instrumental in organising the village Silver Jubilee events.

Wistonian of the Year is chosen by nominations from members of the public through 'Roundabout' magazine and nowadays also via the Wistaston Community Council's Facebook page. The nominations are then considered by Wistaston Community Council's selection committee and the winner has usually contributed to village life over several years or has recently done something worthy and deserving of recognition.



Wistaston Parish Council Chairman's Report

1. Budgets

We again developed our plan with the aim to maintain the same level of Parish council tax based on a band D property. With savings, increased support from CEC because of increases in housing and CIL payments we have also been able to increase support to our community groups from £4573 (2022/23) to £8600 for 2023/24.

I am pleased to confirm this plan was approved at the Council's January meeting.

2. Wistaston in Bloom (WIB)

Following the group's success in last year's North West in Bloom competition reported in the Winter edition of Roundabout the group have been selected to represent our region in the forthcoming prestigious RHS Britain in Bloom finals in the Town category. Congratulations to everyone involved in their latest success.

3. Speed Indicator Device (SID) Broughton Lane.

With the set up and training completed we have been accessing our first period data.

Wistaston Conservation Group

Hello everyone, Just to let you know what is happening in our 'parkland area'.

The 25th Anniversary of The Wistaston Conservation Group.

It's been said on more than one occasion that the work we do is a little like painting the Forth Bridge, in that we must repeat what we do on a regular basis. Well, to prove that point our Project Manager, David O'Hara, who is the last active member of the original group, a few weeks ago whilst sorting through some papers came across a copy of the minutes of the first ever meeting of our group, that was held on the 9th September 1997.

It consisted of an informal walk around the Joey the Swan area, making a list of things that needed to be improved, such as the wet area near to the former filter beds being made into a pond (now the Spinney area), keeping a ten metre strip of unmown grass around the wooded areas for wildlife preservation (now kept and maintained), mowing under the isolated trees to be prevented to assist them to naturally regenerate (now regular practice), the development of 'mini-woodlands' and 'conservation areas' to be established (now done and maintained), and the creation of a picnic area (now established close to the children's play area, courtesy of the parish council). These items and their surrounds need regular inspection, and tidying up, in liaison with our Park Ranger, this is not a criticism or complaint, we realise that it is necessary work that needs to be done to preserve the unique quality of this recreational area.

Something to sing about.

We have recently installed quite a few new bird boxes, many kindly donated by local people* and we have cleaned out existing ones. As can be seen from the monthly bird list, a



healthy local bird population at Joey. The feeding station at the Spinney is a good spot to observe and enjoy various birds.

Over the years many scientists have studied the restorative benefits of birdsong, testing whether it does improve our mood. Birdsong and calls are often cited as helping people recover from stress and allowing them to refocus their attention. It's generally agreed that spending time in nature is the perfect antidote to a busy modern life. Spring in the woodland and coppice at Joey is full of song, ranging from the song of a blackbird or a blackcap to that of the visiting willow warbler. Just under 60 species have been recorded in spring.

*Six bird boxes have been donated by Anthony and Kari Gilbert of Strathaven Avenue for use in the Spinney.

The 'It's Your Neighbourhood' Award,2022. (Level 5, Outstanding)

On the 27 October 2022, David O'Hara, collected the award certificate from the RHS and North-West in Bloom, for another 'Outstanding' achievement.




Wistaston Guiding Report

Wistaston Memorial Hall & Community Centre Community Consultation Questionnaire

WE NEED YOUR HELP

Wistaston Memorial Hall and Community Centre adds immeasurably to the quality of life in Wistaston. This important local facility is managed by a committee of trustees of the Wistaston Memorial Hall and Community Centre charity under a governing document dated 1947.

As the facilities are provided for public benefit the trustees feel it is important that people understand what is planned for the future, including a rebuild of the existing building. Taking no action is not an option as the life span of the existing building is not indefinite. We have had a local structural surveyor complete a survey of the building and the conclusion is that refurbishing is not likely to be financially viable given the age, design layout and the costs which will be incurred.

To kick off the rebuild project we are consulting local residents and Hall users via an online questionnaire to understand your views of this valuable community asset and how you think it could be better utilised within the community in the future and also what improvements, if any, should be considered in its development. We will be approaching the National Lottery for financial support. Your questionnaire responses will be an important input to our bid to provide evidence of need and to improve our chances of success.

You can access the online version of the questionnaire via the link provided on our website available early March 2023 at www.wistastonmemorialhall.uk. Paper versions of the questionnaire will be available at the Hall. Where possible please complete the online version as we have to type in paper version responses. Completed paper versions of the questionnaire should be posted to New Build Committee c/o Wistaston Memorial Hall and Community Centre, Church Lane, Wistaston, Crewe, Cheshire CW2 8ER or put through the Hall letter box.

The project team will be available on April 1st, 15th and 22nd from 10am – 12pm in the Dudley Room at the Hall to help complete online/paper questionnaires and to answer any queries. Hot drinks and biscuits will be provided.

Deadline date for completion of the questionnaire is 30th April 2023.

The trustees are being assisted by the charity Cheshire Community Action, which provides an advisory service for village and community halls in Cheshire and is part of Action with Communities in Rural England (ACRE).

Further information can be found on our website and regular updates on the progression of the project will be published in local communications.



Birds respect squirrels, probably aware of their sharp teeth: we have seen a dozen or so jackdaws fly away from the lawn on approach of a squirrel.

Around 7.30 on a mild morning in early November, as we were loitering on drive, several skeins of geese flew over in close succession, high and in the leisurely 'V' formation of shallow wingbeats, honking contact calls heard only from the last flock. With one exception they were heading in the same westerly direction, presumably on migration. A more solid mass of starlings, with their rapid wingbeats, passed over the house some minutes later, low down as they, unlike the geese, would merely be flying from roost to feeding ground. This spectacle no doubt occurs daily at this time of year, but we are privileged to be in the right place at right time in order to enjoy it.

We recently learned that 'daw' is given in the dictionary as the original word for 'jackdaw'; our oldest tome, 'The New Universal Dictionary', intimating the name is on account of the bird's cry. No explanation is given for the meaning of 'jack' in this instance. Possibly it's a diminutive as the 'daw' is the smallest of the British crows. Our own abbreviation, when listing 'daws' in our winter-feeding survey, however, is 'jaws', but they would hardly have our leg off!

The big freeze of December eventually attracted more birds to our feeding stations: nuthatch and pied wagtail the more infrequent; and a snipe landed in a Lear Drive garden on 15th much to the surprise and delight of resident who confirmed it through his book.

Of autumn's fungi, '*Mycena*' is a common fungus to be found at base of trees: clumps of brown bonnets on long stems, but not for cooking.

With springtime bulbs pushing through, now that we are in mid January, we begin to look forward to longer days and winter's ending.



St. Mary's, Wistaston, Bell Tower and Church Open Day




