



Wistaston Conservation Group

Hello everyone, just to let you know what we've been doing during the last few months.

Improving the area for wildlife.

The Wistaston Conservation Group is keen as ever to make space for nature by installing bat, and bird boxes, and bug hotels. Piles of logs, trimmings, and leaves can make great hiding places for insects and a good spot for hedgehogs if left undisturbed. Some wilder areas of shrubs, brambles, dandelions, nettles, and teasel are good sources of food and shelter for insects, birds, and mammals. The wildflower area provides nectar-rich flowers, and a lifeline for bees, butterflies, and other insects. One particular shrub, blackthorn is an early source of nectar for emerging butterflies in the Spring and the foliage is a food plant for caterpillars, for example, the comma and dozens of moth species depend on the tree for their survival. Similarly, nettles are the food plant for the caterpillars of the red admiral, peacock, small tortoiseshell, painted lady, and comma butterflies. We have recently strimmed and cut back brambles and nettles which allow hidden wildflowers to germinate and fresh regrowth from the nettles. The bright yellow brimstone butterfly emerged on 20th March fluttering across the Old filter beds where we have opened a large area between Hinging Bank and the Spinney, known as 'Filter-bed Hill'.

In January it was decided that because many years had passed since the filter beds had become unused, 'Filter-bed Hill' had been left dormant, and it would be beneficial to clear the brambles that had been spreading thickly and were taking over the whole of the hillside, smothering other types of growth. Towards the end of last year, we had an additional petrol-driven brush cutter donated to us by a resident who no longer had a use for it. Now with three, and sometimes four, cutters working, we made fast work of the brambles, with the rest of the group raking the cuttings into 'Windrow' wildlife habitats. The brambles were unsightly and were restricting those who wanted to walk over the hill towards the Old Covert and the access gate near the Scout Hut and Elm Close, causing the existing pathways to become overused.

The Wood-wide Web

Composting and replenishing the various plant beds and planting both native trees and some ornamental trees continue in our community. Interestingly, the term 'woodwide web' has been coined to give credit to the impact of fungi and their subterranean strands, the Mycelium. These fungal strands stretch and extend, and can absorb minerals that plant roots cannot, and deliver them to the trees. In return, so to speak, the trees give sugars to the fungi. As well as dissolved nutrients, chemical and electrical signals are carried by the fungal network from tree to tree.

Cash donation received. Also, in January a substantial amount of money was given to us by a local lady recently bereaved by the death of her husband. This lady who was often seen walking in our woodland in company with her late husband often enjoyed stopping to chat and was always interested in our work. A commemorative tree has been planted and we hope to place one, or possibly two benches using the rest of the money.

Pet Memorial Pillar.

While clearing some tree trunks and logs left by the tree surgeons, one of our work team recalled the suggestion from a visitor of having something as a 'Pet Memorial' as mentioned in our article of Autumn last year. To this end, we selected a suitable tree trunk and erected it as a memorial pillar.

The original idea was to place the memorial in Old Covert, but the chosen place is now at the edge of that covert near the football pitches, where it is more easily seen. Quite a few people have attached plaques to the pillar, and we would encourage others to do the same, in remembrance of their pets. Some of the smaller logs have been used to build a rustic bench in the same place.

Sandie Wilson our very talented local wood artist has helped with this bench and has kindly donated a statue of a cat and dog which now adds a welcome finish to the memorial pillar, as well as a 'Bug Hotel' that has been placed on a tree in the Spinney.



How are the mighty fallen.

Over the weekend of the 25/26 March part of a huge Willow tree at the edge of the Spinney area fell onto the feature known as 'Woodhenge'. No injury was caused and our group made the fallen timber safe by removing as much of it as we could, using just hand saws and axes. The now stable main trunk was left to be removed by contractors employed by the parish council.



If anyone would like to meet us to discuss what we do or suggest ideas for projects, we usually work in the 'Joey the Swan' area on Monday mornings. Further contact details are shown on the W.C.G. noticeboard close to the Church Lane entrance, online (search on Wistaston Conservation Group), and on Facebook.

Wistaston Memorial Hall and Community Centre



At the AGM in March, John Cooke stood down as President of the Hall. John had been on the committee for 41 years, during which time he undertook many roles including representing Wistaston Parish Council and Wistaston Memorial Hall Bowling Club, Secretary from 1997 to 2009 and management of the shares portfolio. On behalf of the Trustees, members of the community, Chair Diane Edge-Robinson thanked John for all the time he had given and presented him with a clematis climbing plant, appropriately named 'President'. Eileen Bamber was formally sworn in as the new President.

In other news, the Wistaston Memorial Hall & Community Centre, Community Consultation Questionnaire was opened early in March and was closed on the 30th of April, with a fabulous response. 386 households answered the call to give their views on the need for the rebuilding of the Memorial Hall. Drop-in sessions were also held on the 1st, 15th and 22nd April to answer questions and let everyone know how the project was developing. 17 letters of support have been received from organisations that currently use the Hall. Analysis of the responses is now underway. The next step is to review each build option available for its financial and practical viability. Once upon a time Wistaston's Joey the Swan hit the national headlines and then began the story of how the area now known as Joey the Swan eventually became our local beauty spot.

Article taken from The Sunday Express January 14 1973

Village spends £850 on swan that died in 1937

Everyone in the village thinks so much of Joey the Swan that they are to spend £850 and hold a religious service in his memory.

Although Joey was killed by a passing van 36 years ago people in Wistaston, near Crewe, Cheshire, cannot forget how he captured everyone's heart. Five years ago a medallion in the shape of a swan was added by the parish council to their chairman's chain of office.

Now they have decided on an even greater honour. They are to spend £750 to landscape the acre of land now overgrown where Joey used to live and to build a bridge over a stream there. A further £100 will go on a painted sign of Joey which will be unveiled during a service.

Mr James Akers the council clerk told me: I have never heard of a swan being honoured in this way

'His home was once a favourite spot to which families from miles around used to walk to feed him. When his mate died he was very lonely and grew fantastically tame and affectionate.

'We are spending the money to make his old home like a village green again by planting trees and flowering shrubs and grassing the area.

'We shall put up something like a pub sign with a painting of the swan and a plaque with the words: 'On a pool on this site there lived until 1937 a white swan known as Joey and this is to commemorate his memory for all time because of the great affection in which he was held by the village.'

The service at the spot will be a simple but touching one.'

Joey was the lone survivor of a family of swans brought to the area by Sir Edward Delves-Broughton, owner of Wistaston Hall until 1889.

When Joey was killed the council wanted to commemorate him but they did not own the land. Now the present owners, (the Fathers of the Oblate Mission, now Retreat) have presented the land to the village.

Mrs Dorothy Furmston the Council chairman said 'We hope to get a grant from the Department of the Environment. The home of this much-loved swan is derelict and for a long time we have wanted to return it to its former glory.'

Historian Miss Dorothy Sylvester who lives in the village said; 'Swans do have a fantastic life-span and this one could have been at least 70 when he died.'

Joey the Swan

In Wistaston there lived a swan

And so, alas. he died. So now he's gone, this handsome swan Where all the good swans fly. He should have stayed upon his pool And watched the world go by.


Very many thanks to Bill Atkins for the above news item and poem which were discovered in his family

Re. last article, and attempt to explain the 'jack' of 'jackdaw', mystery solved. Trawling through bird-guides we found two instances of the call given as 'tchack'. Putting 'tchack' and 'daw' together would seem to state the obvious. As meerkats would say: 'simples'!

The wren, second smallest of British breeding birds (smallest being goldcrest), one of the commonest sounds in countryside, especially near water, we heard infrequently this winter. Susceptible to cold weather, after so many mild winters have they succumbed to December's big freeze? At the other end of the spectrum is there an increase in magpies? Larger numbers are seen these days on our country walks. Maybe fewer magpie traps are in operation along with a reduction in gamekeeping. It is rare that our garden is without a magpie and the antics of this intelligent bird are always fun to watch.

Flocks of small birds in treetops of allotment bank, Sandylands Park, are always goldfinches when we look, their beaks especially pointed in order to probe seeds from teasel or thistle heads. Now that trapping them for caged songsters is illegal numbers of this colourful finch are rising.

Six of our winter thrushes – fieldfares – gathered in a neighbour's tree 19 Jan, and the house sparrow terrace had its preliminary inspection in January, occupation taking place in February.

Egrets began to feature in February, with Lynda Simmons witnessing one flying over her house by Wistaston Brook and recalling a sight two weeks previously. On first day of March Allan and Jenny Poole of Chesterton Drive saw two little egrets in their tree. (Little egrets exhibit yellow feet as a distinguishing mark, not easy to spot when they are standing in mud!)

Chiffchaff song prevailed in allotment bank late March, a very common sound in the countryside this year we are finding.

After our security light lit up one night in February a fox was discovered loping down the street from our drive. Light has been set off since, once again by Brer Fox and once by a cat. Mostly, however, a quick flick of the curtains at the time reveals nothing. They know how to 'hop it'. 24 March and a daytime fox was spotted mounting bank in front of the house, escaping into allotments.

The glorious weather of Easter Saturday brought brimstone and orange tip butterflies to the garden while Easter Sunday brought the grizzly spectacle of the massacre of a pigeon by the neighbourhood sparrowhawk. Neither of the magpie pair watching had the pluck (pun intended) to challenge the possession of this hearty meal!

A late report came in from Mr. Vaughan of Red Hall Farm, who records swallow arrivals. This year his first appeared on 8 April, quite different from last year's 22nd. He also gave date of 8 April again for 2018/19.




