

BRITAIN IN BLOOM JUDGES INSPECT WISTASTON

Britain in Bloom judges from The Royal Horticultural Society (https://www.rhs.org.uk/) visited Wistaston on 1st August to judge the village in the Town category of the Britain in Bloom 2023 UK Finals.



The two judges travelled from

Huddersfield and Jersey and met the Chairman of Wistaston Parish Council John Moore, and members of the Wistaston in Bloom group and Wistaston Conservation Group at Wistaston Memorial Hall, prior to inspecting the village's gardens and flowerbeds and the Joey the Swan parkland area.

The winners of each Britain in Bloom category will be announced at an awards ceremony in the autumn.

Wistaston has scooped many accolades in previous years including a number of Gold awards.


Bill Heath, Secretary of Wistaston in Bloom, said that Members of the Bloom Group, Wistaston Conservation Group, Wistaston Parish Council, Wistaston Park Ranger Peter Baskerville, Crewe Road Nurseries, together with residents, all played their part in preparing the village for the judging. A representative from The Royal Horticultural Society congratulatied the 44 community gardening groups who have secured a place in the 2023 Britain in Bloom UK Finals. He said that this year, groups will again be judged against criteria with the environment, community engagement and horticulture at its core.

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Wistaston Tennis Aces win Wimbledon!

George Raiswell and Charlie Robinson, from Wistaston Jubilee Tennis Club, have won their Men's Doubles Finals competition at Wimbledon (https://www.wimbledon.com/)

The pairing won through to playing on the hallowed turf by winning both their 'Play Your Way to Wimbledon' FAST4 Tennis Area Finals and Regional Finals.

2023 is the first year that an Adults 'Play Your Way to Wimbledon' doubles competition has been introduced for Men and Women aged 19+ years.



The victories meant that on Wednesday 9 August 2023 George and Charlie entered The All England Lawn Tennis Club gates on Church Road in London SW19, to play in the 'Play Your Way to Wimbledon' National Finals on the grass practice courts at Aorangi Park.

George and Charlie got to use the Wimbledon courts and facilities usually reserved for professional players competing in The Championships, as well as receiving a personalised tour of the historic Grounds and Museum.

Competing in white match kit at SW19 the pairing played a round robin format against two other pairs to win their Group to battle to the Quarter finals, then Semifinals and through to the Final for a momentous inaugural Men's Doubles win on the iconic courts at the world famous venue.

Play Your Way to Wimbledon, powered by Vodafone, is the UK's largest individual mass participation tennis competition and is delivered by Vodafone in partnership with the LTA and The All England Lawn Tennis Club, forming part of the brand's ongoing commitment to support grassroots tennis in the UK, whilst encouraging more people to pick up a racket.

By the time this latest editorial finds its way through your letterbox, the 2023 cricketing campaign would be coming to the end and begs the question where does the time go since my last editorial.

Our First XI competing in The Cheshire Cricket League Division 3, have at the time of compiling this latest editorial, completed just over half their cricketing programme and are holding a midtable position having won six of their fixtures with another abandoned. The last three matches up to 8th July have produced some really effective cricket and a continuance of this form could very well see them attain a final end of season position in the top three. Watch this space.

Special note:- It was a day of milestones in the fixture at home to Glazebury (1st July), as Oliver Botham starred for the 1st team with 150 as we posted 286-6, James Hogben then taking 5 for 15 from eight overs as Glazebury were bowled out for 38 in reply.

Our Second XI competing in The Cheshire Cricket League Division C (South/Central) have had a harder season to contend with and at present are bottom of their division. From their opening twelve fixtures they have managed a single victory against **Prestbury CC** in late May. In fairness, they have contended in three fixtures in which they came very close to victory, together with having to concede two further fixtures. In their fixture against Toft at the beginning of July they failed by two runs to claim victory, a match in which Keith Thornhill starred with an unbeaten 107.

Our ladies eleven 'The Swans', competing in Division 4 (West) of Women's Cricket League have won two of their five opening fixtures and are currently fourth in their league. In the three fixtures that they lost the scores were extremely close and could have easily gone to 'The Swans'. With a game in hand over other competitors, the season could easily see them finished in a strong position in their league. Availability within the team is good.

Our junior sides are competing in their respective leagues within The South Cheshire Junior Cricket League.

Under 9's: Playing in a league of 14 teams, our Under 9's are conducting their campaign very well and at the time of this editorial they hold 8th position in the league with 74 points from their opening twelve fixtures.

<u>Under 11's</u>: Our <u>Under 11's</u> are enjoying a productive season contesting in a league containing 17 teams. Currently they hold 5th position having won seven of their fixtures and losing just four, with a further match abandoned and another victory gained when their opponents had conceded the fixture. Watch this space. Looking good.

Under 15's: The Under 15's have played eleven fixtures in their league and have accrued 43 Points, from a playing record of winning three fixtures, losing seven and one match conceded.

Team Updates:- Numbers could be tight going in to 2024 playing season, but with additional recruitment we as a cricket club, should be able to run Under 9's, 11's, 13's & 15/16's. Now is an excellent time for young players to seize the opportunity of joining our club. You would be most welcome.

In May the cricket club held a fund raising event in the aid of Mind. The amount donated was so generous and a total of well over £4000 was achieved. Due to the last editorial being submitted before the final donations had been made, it was not possible to include this information in the Summer edition of Roundabout.

Our cricket club held the second Wistaston C.C. Softball Festival on Sunday 2nd July at The Brittles. Eight teams including Wistaston Village Cricket Club attended, other teams included Grappenhall Cricket Club, Wallasey Cricket Club, Aston Cricket Club and Oakmere Cricket Club. The weather held and with the amazing help offered on the day by Nicki Jarvis and all those who assisted her, a successful event was achieved which was fantastic .Thank you one and all for your splendid assistance.


Hello again everyone, just to keep you aware of what we have been doing lately. But first, a brief deviation from our usual topics, into the realms of local history.

Origins of 'The Spinney'. Our group has been carrying out quite a lot of work over the past few years in the area known as The Spinney. This land and the surrounding area had been badly neglected for a long time, some of the trees there were in a dangerous condition, and expert advice indicated the necessity for them to be taken down.

Not many people are aware of the history connected with this land. In the very early part of the last century, the land was purchased from local landowners, the Walthall family, by the local authority with a view to establishing a waste treatment plant. The timeline for the construction of this infrastructure is unclear, but it is believed it was in full operation in the early 1930s and occupied quite a large area of land, as shown in the plan of the site at its maximum extent. When the plant was no longer required, Nantwich Rural District Council offered it to Wistaston Parish Council, but they declined the offer, so the two parcels of land were sold off. The purchaser of the west parcel (the old Settling Tanks) planned to create a fish farm, but that never transpired. The purchaser of the east parcel (the old Filter Beds) applied for planning permission to build houses, but that was refused.

Eventually, Crewe and Nantwich Borough Council obtained a Derelict Land Grant, which enabled them to remove both the Settlement Tanks and the Filter Beds, but nothing happened to the area until The Spinney was created. We still find pieces of buried masonry, concrete and drain pipes when we are planting trees in the area. Eventually, Wistaston parish council after protracted enquiries, were able to trace the current owners who, although reluctant to negotiate a change of ownership to the parish, were happy for the land to be administered for the benefit of the public, which explains why our group are now working on improving





Natural Woodland Re-cycling.

The Birch tree shown in the photograph should live for many years, also the Bracket fungus growing on the bark will co-exist by feeding on the tree, as the tree continues to grow and expand so will the fungus, the bulk of which is hidden inside the tree.

The tree will not be harmed at first, as the fungus only feeds on the dead outer layers of the bark, but as time passes the fungus inside the tree will weaken the tree's structure, cause it to become unstable and eventually fall. Sometimes with very little indication that this will happen.

Wood has a very strong structure that gives a tree amazing strength and durability, but the fungi are able to break down these tough structures, and by means of fine filaments



known as Mycelium, release nutrients back into the soil to feed a fresh generation of tree seedlings.

A Swift Result?

A number of nest boxes have been made, donated and installed across our open green spaces and wooded areas. Many birds will enter these nest boxes during the Autumn and Winter, looking for a suitable place to roost or perhaps feed. They often use the same boxes for nesting the following Spring. Both great tits and blue tits will not seriously look for nesting sites until February or March.

The design of the nest box suits different bird species. For example, a wide opening provides a nest site for the robin (note box S10 at the top of the Spinney) and a small round aperture for the blue tit (note box S1 at the bottom end of the Spinney). Many of the boxes at the Spinney and the Woodside Covert have been successful with adult birds rearing their young. WCG (Wistaston Conservation Group) have taken care to position these new boxes between north and east, as this gives protection from direct sunlight, wind and rain, at a height of 2 to 4 metres with the box slightly tilted forward to allow any rain to run clear of the entrance. It is also important to have a clear flight path to the box.

This Summer the UK Parliament will debate how to help swifts, one of our summer visitors, by asking builders to provide swift bricks in new buildings. The debate came about thanks to a RSPB petition. "Make swift bricks compulsory in new housing to help red-listed birds".

The Many Facets of Conservation work.

We were asked by the parish council to solve a long standing problem to do with grassmowing on the football fields at the 'Joey' area. Whenever the grass was cut with the usual method of a heavy mowing machine towed by a farm tractor, one of the access panels (manhole cover) would be struck causing the cast steel cover to become dislodged. The cover was very difficult to see due to the length of the grass before being cut, and once dislodged took a lot of time and effort to replace.

A bag of concrete mix, a bucket of water, and a bit of skill took care of the matter. The photo shows one of our group using his expertise to finish the job.

New Build Project Update

The New Build project has been busy evaluating the range of alternatives for how the project can be delivered in terms of financial and practical viability. We are following The National Lottery Community Fund guidelines for how to do this. First step, to determine the options available has been completed. Whether any of these options are feasible depends on a range of factors, the ownership arrangements, the funding available, the location, the accessibility, the timing and scale of the project. Meetings around options have been held with Wistaston Sports and Leisure Association and Wistaston Memorial Hall Bowling Club. We are looking to meet with the Wistaston Jubilee Tennis Club in August. A key task is gathering information about the advantages and disadvantages of each option, one of the most difficult being to cost each option. Our aim is to complete the process by the end of 2023. Look out for updates on our web page.

Regarding project timescales, the earliest we would start is 2026. During the build we will be looking to find alternative accommodation for our Hall users to minimise the impact of the project

In June the Trustees gave approval to hire Nantwich architect Bower Edleston to draw up the plans for the new Hall. Bower Edleston has considerable experience of village hall builds being involved in the new village hall builds at Worleston, Warmingham and Audlem. They are currently working on the Hough village hall extension/refurbishment project.

This Autumn we will be focussing on completing the options appraisal, doing a design brief for Bower Edleston and exploring other funding options. See our New Build page at www.wistastonmemorialhall.uk for latest news.


Wistaston Memorial Hall

In April, Graham Jones, Memorial Hall caretaker, witnessed a raptor capturing a pigeon in Wistaston Green Road, flying off towards scout hut before the 'Rising Sun'. Guess the hearty meal made it thirsty! As with ourselves, Graham is 'pigeon pestered'.

20 April brought our first peacock butterfly, very few butterflies visiting thereafter, bees seeking out our flowers rather more often, especially the shy dullish pinks of berberis.

Talking of the eternal pest – grey squirrel – it was introduced from North America 1877-1929. Its varied diet includes crops, tree bark and sap, birds' eggs, young birds and insects. Continuously growing teeth must be worn down so a need to grind on nuts and seeds. An acute sense of smell relocates winter caches of food. Fruit is supplementary to diet, with soil for mineral content and roughage. In 1937 the Government prohibited importation and release or keeping of 'greys', except under licence, but to no avail in reducing numbers.

Late April and a young wood pigeon was flapping wings, soliciting food from parent, and we had a close-up view of the two standing on edge of bird-bath, youngster taking food from parent's crop: the protein-rich substance similar to a mammal's milk, which youngster itself stores in its crop.

Margaret Skerratt produced photos of a female great spotted woodpecker on feeders, along with goldfinches and wren, and they are a joy to see.

We played our song recording against Andrew's and the two proved the species. July and the short-lived reappearance of the neighbourhood sparrowhawk on our lawn, but no kill.

As the month races on we can enjoy the bouts of thunder rain after so much hot dry weather!

This event took place to celebrate children's gardening and to inspire the next generation of gardeners. The Berkeley were delighted to showcase the wonderful work that has been taking place at the school over the last few years with support from Mrs Bond, a



grandparent of a child in Year 2. She has transformed the mini Berkeley garden whilst teaching the children all about different plants and engaging them in a love for growing things. The Berkeley garden is shown centre below.

Children have grown different plants, vegetables and herbs including radishes, lettuce, tomatoes, strawberries, courgettes and lavender. Some of these have then be used to make delicious cakes and biscuits.

For the wheelbarrow competition, Mrs Bond was asked to help along-

side Miss Brown, Headteacher. The children have been learning about bee friendly plants which had been grown from tiny seeds. These, along with other plants, were incorporated into a fabulous wheelbarrow with a bee friendly theme. The school are really proud of the result and the work that has taken place to raise the profile of gardening at The Berkeley Academy.



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Wistaston Scout Leader awarded **MBE in Kings Birthday Honours** list

John Bennett has been awarded an MBE in the Kings Birthday Honours list, for services to young people in Cheshire.



John was born in what is now Milton Keynes in 1944. He was a wolf cub and then a boy scout with 1st Wolverton Scout Group. He left Wolverton in 1964 to move to Crewe where his future wife lived. He took a break from scouting as he settled down with a new job (police officer with Cheshire Constabulary) and a young family. In 1974 he responded to a plea for help from 38th South West Cheshire and became the Scout Leader for that group. Pressures of shift work in the early 1980's were such that he could not devote the necessary time to the group and he stepped back and remained in the District Fellowship. He became involved in fund raising activities especially the Crewe Gang Show with which he is still connected and is preparing for the 2024 show as their Technical Director. His Police career was such that he had one weekend off every four weeks and during the summer months that weekend was normally spent as a warden at the County Camp Site at Sandiway. He still spends a lot of time at the site in his role as County Safety Advisor. When he became Group Scout Leader (GSL) at Wistaston Scout Group in 2007 he took over a very successful group. Many of the core leaders at that time are still with the group. Thanks to those leaders, and others who have joined over the years the group has flourished and is the largest in the district with two Beaver colonies, two Cub packs and two Scout troops all supported by about 30 leaders.


The new Scout Centre was built during John Bennett's tenure and whilst he drove that project forward (including managing the fund raising) he had a fantastic team behind him and without them the project would have failed. He is currently GSL 35th South West Cheshire, District Secretary South West Cheshire, County Safety Advisor and member of Cheshire Scouts Trustee Board and as he said: he was very surprised, honoured and humbled (and over the moon) with the news. He was sure that without the fantastic leaders he had worked with over the years this award would not have been possible.

The Scout Group most recently gained National recognition for a 'ribbon of poppies' which they had made from recycled soft drinks bottles. This ribbon had more than 5000 'poppies' and was suspended from the tower St Mary's Church Wistaston and was more than 30 metres long. This had such an impact that John was asked for one of the Cub Scouts to meet the Duchess of Cambridge to discuss the display and the impact remembrance had on young people. A STATUE FOR ADA

Dorothy Flude, local Councillor and ex-Mayor of Cheshire East, was passionate about local history. In particular, she wanted a statue of suffragist Ada Nield Chew placed in Crewe in order that she be remembered.

Ada first became noticed in 1894 when she wrote a series of anonymous letters to the *Crewe Chronicle* outlining the poor conditions in local textile factories for working women; she lived in the town and worked at Compton's Clothing Factory in Bridle Road. She signed herself 'A



Crewe Factory Girl' and was forced to leave her employment to save the jobs of her fellow workers when factory owners tried to uncover her identity and punish those who agreed with her.

Undeterred, Ada took up the cause of working women as an organiser for the Trade Unions, campaigner for the Independent Labour Party and a strong working-class voice in the suffragist movement; Ada wanted votes for women, but also the freedom for girls to be raised as human rather than simply domestic servants.

Ada was a true character – lacking formal education but highly literate, an avid reader, a devoted mother, a keen theatre-goer and a woman totally uninterested in fashion (and often sporting a rakishly-angled hat!)
