
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Wistaston Parish Council **Chairman's Report**

1. Budget for 2024

After a period of several years maintaining our precept level on households this year we face considerable cost increases.

Main areas of increase are in Administration, Contractors for flower beds, JTS grasslands and Environmental support for our Woodlands.

We continue to support our voluntary groups and for this year at a reduced level and we have no additions to capital plans.

Overall, our budget requirement is an increase of around £3000. This represents a cost increase for a band D property of £0.78 pence per year.

2. Wistaston in Bloom

This group is on hold following the retirement of their leader Bill Heath and alternative plans have been made for the current year.

The 6 main flower beds will be planted by our contractor like previous years. The remaining 5 permanently planted beds including the Sensory garden are to be maintained by our Conservation group under the guidance of their leader Dave O'Hara.

All the planting of tubs, boxes, baskets and a small number of verge areas will not be completed this year.

Thanks are expressed to our Conservation team and the Motherwell care centre who have agreed to carry out irrigation and maintenance for the flower bed on Beech Drive.

If any resident wants to help for the future we need a new volunteer group and Team leader to help plan and coordinate our contractor and planting program. If interested please contact our Clerk or if wanting to discuss the issues in more detail contact the Chairman.

3. CEC consultation proposals.

a) Ward representation for CEC Councillors.

New changes in boundaries will transfer our Wells Green Ward south of Crewe road into a Crewe Ward.

Most of Willaston will merge with Wistaston and the area North of Wistaston Green Road transferred to Leighton.

Our Parish will be represented by additional CEC councillors.(currently 2)

b) Trees

The new policy for the future is trees will not be replaced in verges unless over 3 metres (10 feet) from the kerb edge.

Over time this would mean the vast majority of trees will disappear from our Town and Village roadsides.

In Wistaston two examples are Park Drive and Westfield Drive.

Our Council is challenging this proposal as we consider suitable trees mainly low growing ornamental examples should be allowed.

Wistaston **Conservation Group**

What we did one Monday in October.

We planted a sack of daffodil bulbs in the beds behind the noticeboard at Joev the Swan.





This task was quickly done with the large number of volunteers who turned up. At the same time the hedge on Church Lane received a trimming, the warm and wet weather having promoted new growth since its last cutting. Meanwhile, others started to take wood chippings, that had been left from the felling of an unsafe tree to the Spinney pathway which being a popular area for people to visit, needs

the surface renewing on a regular basis to keep it as mud-free as possible.

After our 11 o'clock coffee break we all moved to the Spinney to carry on with our tidying up that we had begun the week before. Grass and nettles were strimmed, and brush and brambles were removed from around sapling trees planted at the edge of the football fields.

We even found the time to leaf-blow the car park at Beech Drive.

Himalayan balsam (*Impatiens glandulifera*) is an invasive, non-native weed, that we are constantly looking to remove.

A relative of Busy Lizzie, it is a plant with an attractive flower and for this reason was introduced to the U.K. as a garden plant in 1839. It spread rapidly to the countryside, and has become a chronic problem nationally and locally along the banks of Wistaston Brook. It spreads quickly, out-competing native plants. The flowers



are sought by bees, producing many seed pods that explode, dispersing up to 800 seeds per plant, which travel a considerable distance. The seeds will also spread in moving water, up to 4 metres from the parent plant.

At a height of 2.5 metres Himalayan balsam is now the tallest annual plant in the U.K., and is listed on Schedule 9 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 in England and Wales, making it an offence to plant it due to it spreading throughout the countryside.

Balsam is such a tenacious plant it can take up to 3 years to be eradicated from an area. As it is shallow rooted, it is quite easily removed but the plants need to be pulled up between April and June before they set seed. We regularly check for the appearance of new growth. If there are no seeds present the plants can be composted. If seed pods are evident we are advised to burn the material. Fortunately, to date, we have not had to carry out the latter procedure.

Drainage Problems

The drainage in certain parts of the 'Joey' area leaves a lot to be desired. This is mainly due to a deterioration of the drainage system due to age, the terracotta pipes having become broken or disjointed allowing the ingress of tree roots.

The recent very wet weather has worsened the problem and we are trying to find the ineffective drainpipes with a view to clearing them. Unfortunately, many of the drains are buried deep in the ground and are beyond our limited capabilities to be uncovered.

However, we have been working on one section of pipe near to the north end of the Spinney where it passes underneath the raised boardwalk and path between the scout hut and the football fields.

The problem here is that the water to the north of the boardwalk pools and forms a large pond that in hot weather becomes stagnant and gives off a very unpleasant smell.

We were unable to find the lower end of the pipe due to debris collected over many years, and we were forced to break into the only visible section to gain access for the rodding to begin. We had some success and the flow increased, but a better solution was sought by rodding the upper end of the



pipe, i.e. the outflow from the aforementioned pond.

It proved difficult to locate this pipe due to the very murky water and it was decided to wait for the water level to drop.

On the second Monday of the new year we resumed our search for the outflow, and we were pleased to see that the water level had fallen even further than before Christmas despite the recent heavy rains. Unfortunately, we were still unable to locate the outlet precisely, but we are confident when the water level drops even further we will be able to finish the job.

Rebuild Project Update


Since November 2023, the Rebuild Project Team have continued to evaluate the range of options for how the project can be delivered in terms of financial and practical viability. We are following The National Lottery Community Fund (TNL-CF) guidelines for how to do this and currently at Stage 2 of the process. This involves gathering information about the advantages and disadvantages of each option, one of the most difficult being to cost each option. In the last issue of Roundabout we stated the deadline for obtaining all costs had been set as November 17th. This was very optimistic! It's now the end of February 2024 and the team are just completing this task. Next step is to develop a system to assess each option (TNLCF Stage 3) and then we will move on to scoring each option (TNLCF Stage 4). We aim to present the chosen option to the WMH&CC Trustees during the Spring. In parallel we have started to work on the Design brief for the new Hall.

You may have noticed we have changed our project name from New Build to Rebuild. This is to make it clear to funders we already have a Memorial Hall which is being rebuilt. Some funders do not give grants for new buildings.

willaston **WOMEN'S INSTITUTE**

In September this year Willaston WI will be celebrating its 75th Anniversary. In 1949 Dorothy Lomax, who lived at Woleston Hall, called a meeting in the Tennis Pavilion. 100 women turned up and, as the venue couldn't hold so many, the first meeting began in September of that year with the group already having a waiting list.

In 1951 the population of Willaston was 1882 which indicates a significant interest in joining WI. It was stipulated at that early stage only residents of Willaston could join.

The group has continued to flourish and over the years various anniversaries have been celebrated. Trees have been planted in the village, and a WI plaque was placed on Mike Hayward Green on Wistaston Road to mark the Golden Jubilee. Meetings have been held at St John's Chapel, St Luke's Church in Coppice Road and in recent years The Acacia Suite at the Masonic Hall.

Following a gap, whilst covid had to be avoided, meetings are once again being held on the second Wednesday of each month from 7pm. In January Andrew Ridgeway took us on a virtual tour of Nantwich. He gave a detailed account of the history and houses in Welsh Row, one of the oldest parts of the town. We have a wide variety of speakers lined up for the rest of this year. Talks on style, flowers, Harold Shipman, training guide dogs and more.

Mid October and starling flocks increasing in number, congregations of birds gathering on rooftops, chattering incessantly. Poor showing of perching birds at home feeders, even goldfinches, high numbers not materializing till the wild and wet weather of December and January when numbers of 'perchers' returned to normality. Was natural food still plentiful in October? No absence, however, of jackdaws, very much monopolizing ownership of lawn and suet balls.

Caterpillars are seeking out hidey-holes in which to pupate, doubtless to be parasitized by the ichneumon fly, to be eaten alive from within. It is the season, also, of delicate little 'carpet' moths, named after their resemblance to traditional carpet patterns, and a triangular shape when at rest.

Our first sighting of winter thrushes (sadly not in Wistaston) was 29 October over Shropshire Union Canal near Whitchurch: fieldfares issuing their chattering contact calls.

November, breakfast-time, and multiple skeins of geese in their loose 'V' formations, flying high, with constant contact calls and always south-westerly.

Only one chaffinch noted for inclusion in our winter feeding survey on approach of mid December. Are they falling victim to trichomonosis, the disease to which greenfinches are especially prone, characterized by difficulty in swallowing and general lethargy? Contaminated food can be a cause, which is why regular cleaning of feeders is advised.

It seems unusual to see a pair of robins tolerating each other in early winter. Books inform that it is midwinter when a female chooses her mate, yet the pair in question have been together much earlier. There is no courtship display, so they may be two birds of the same gender who are not showing the exceptionally aggressive behaviour normally associated with the species, as long as they keep

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
